Paluka of Council Bluffs, is coaching the Omaha teams. Judges for the debate at Omaha will be Professor Smith, Creighton debate coach; Elwood Murray, Abraham Lincoln High coach, and Thomas Tacy, Council Bluffs attorney.

The question for debate will be: "Resolved, That congress should be empowered to annul by a two-thirds vote those decisions of the supreme court which declare acts of congress unconstitutional."

The University of Omaha debaters will meet Midland in their next debate, March 16.

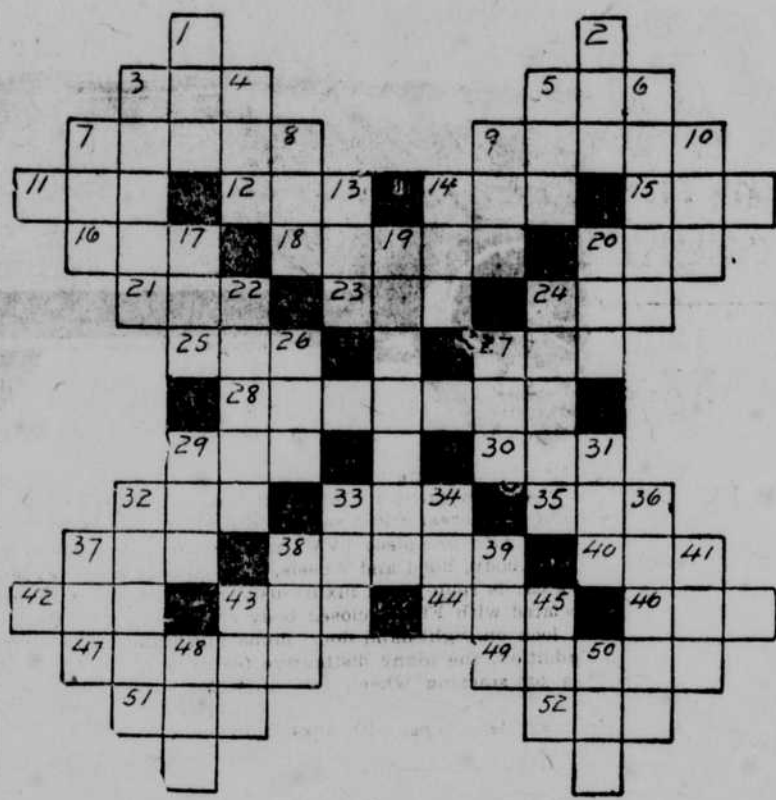
#### \$40,000 CHURCH AT GENEVA, PLAN

An architect was engaged this week to submit plans for the building which is to be started in April.

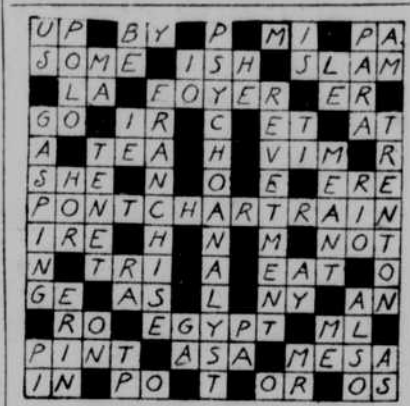

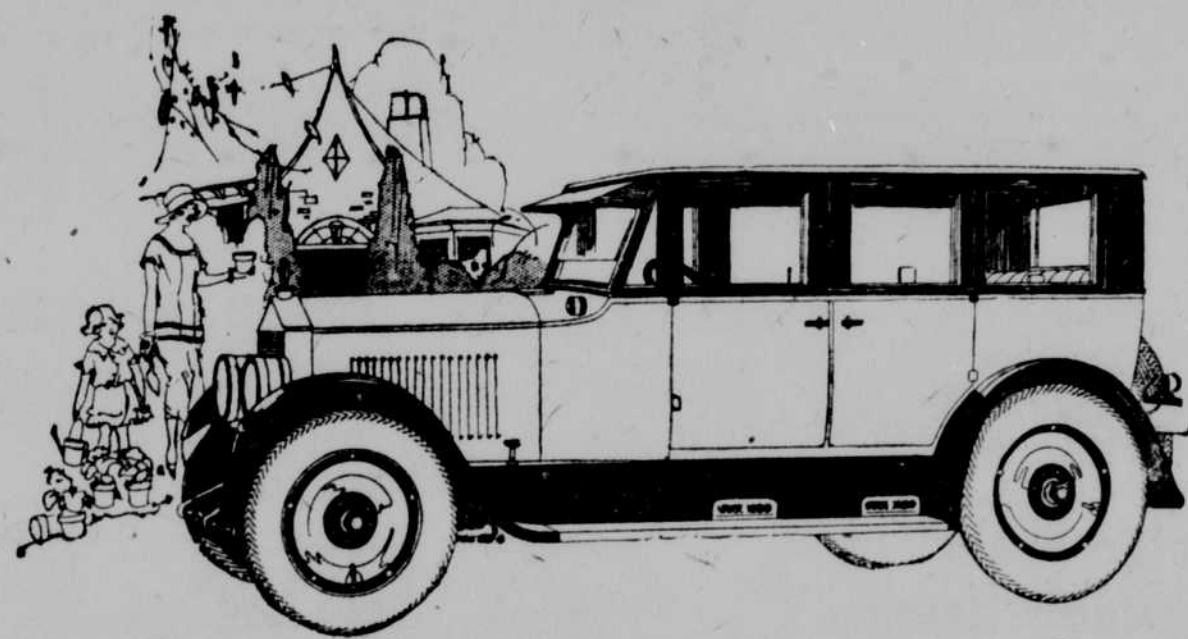
