

Church Makes Rapid Strides

First Lutheran Congregation Will Review Pastor's First Six Years.

Rev. Lawrence Acker will complete six years as pastor of First Lutheran church, Thirty-first and Jackson streets tomorrow.

Hardly 100 souls made up the congregation six years ago, housed in a five-year-old building at Twentieth and Mason streets.

Three young men of the church are now studying for the ministry and one young woman is graduating from a synodical institution as a deaconess.

The organizations of the church are active and growing. The Waltham league was very active and instrumental in bringing the international convention of Waltham leaguers with 2,000 visitors to the city in 1922.

During the first months of Rev. Mr. Acker's pastorate, the attendance averaged 60, while the average during January and February of this year was better than 215.

The church has a complete multi-track equipment, upon which the Sunday morning program is printed, as well as folders and programs.

Irish Peasantry in Terrible Want

Famine Conditions Are Culmination of Years of Want and Privation.

Galway, March 7.—Famine conditions in Connemara are partly the culmination of years of want and privation.

Times are always hard in Connemara, and year after year the people live on the verge of starvation, with the result that when a year comes which has an exceptional rainfall and little sunshine, resulting in poor harvests and poor chances of gathering in the past, the population is in no shape to withstand additional hardships and feverish illness soon becomes prevalent.

The conditions under which the Connemara peasant lives are appalling. An Connemara cottage compares unfavorably even with a pighouse in any other country. It generally consists of a two-room dwelling—one room, the kitchen, in which meals are cooked and eaten, and the other a bedroom, in which the whole family sleeps.

Cases are known where four or five people sleep in the same bed, while I myself inspected a cottage in which 12 people slept in the same bedroom. It is rather a misnomer to call these places dwellings at all. The rooms are at the most eight feet high, while two windows—one in each room—serve for ventilation and light.

In nine cases out of 10 there is no glass in the framework of the windows, a piece of canvas generally sufficing to keep out the wind and rain. The doorway serves not only as an entrance—it is, also, an outlet for the smoke from the peat fire.

Most of the miserable hovels are legacies left from the days of the old type of Irish landlord, who cared nothing for the welfare of the people who worked for them and who never spent a cent on improvements or upkeep. Additional government improvements in sight are a new land act and the purchase of unprofitable holdings from the farmers.
