London Society

London, March 14.—The first court which will be held at Buckingham palace immediately after Easter will be devoted mainly to the presentation of young brides, all in their early 20s. There will be several young Americans, among them who will be prominent hostesses during the season.

The American Countess Galloway, a slight, beautiful brunette, will be one of them. Viscountess Ridley, a bride of last year, is another. The most interesting one of all is the Hon. Mrs. Patrick Bisham, formerly Miss Evelyn Price of Galveston, who defied superstition last year by being married May 13 in a green dress with 33 bridesmaids. The idea of meeting all the young brides at the first court is said to have originated with Queen Mary.

The early American tourists have been doing over the site from which Devonshire house has almost disappeared. They are looking for relics. The most interesting souvenir has been acquired by Mr. and Mrs. H. R. Bowman, of Garden City, who are staying at the Berkeley, just across the street. They have captured one of the famous black and white ovals that lived in the huge gardens behind Devonshire house and whose hoofs have been heard all over Mayfair. There were originally three ovals, but two disappeared since the noise of demolition began. Mrs. Bowman found the third ailing in a bush. It is now recovering and will sail for Long Island next week.

The new American Ambassador Houghton, with Mrs. Houghton, and their pretty daughters, are expected in London this month. Their first public appearance will probably be at a banquet given in honor of the new ambassador by the American society in the Abraham Lincoln room at the Savoy.

Mr. Houghton cannot present his credentials to the prince of Wales who will be "king" during his father's absence, but must present them to the king in person. The banquet, therefore, may have to be postponed until the ambassador has had an audience with the king.


