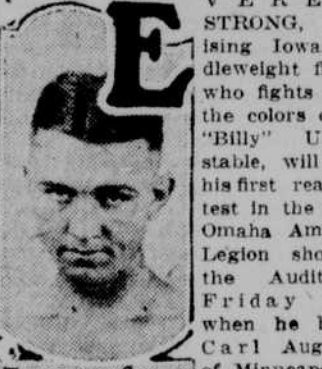

Football Rules Committee Decides to Return Kickoff to 40-Yard Line. NEW YORK, March 14.—The most question of the kickoff was decided today by the football rules committee, which announced that the coming season would have the ball put into play from the kickers 40-yard line. No tee will be permitted. The final session of the committee was adjourned upon announcement of the death of Walter Camp, secretary of the body. Such changes or interpretations of rules as had been decided upon previously, however, were announced by W. R. Oakeson, Lehigh, member of the advisory committee to the rules committee. The blocked kick would be changed to provide that the ball goes to the side recovering if it does not cross the line of scrimmage. If the kicking side recovers another down is counted instead of a first down being registered. Because an incident in an Army game last fall was called to the committee's attention, in the future physicians and trainers may go on the field without attracting the referee's attention.
