

GERMAN ELECTION MAJORITY LACKING

Dr. Karl Jarres Leads Field of Candidates in Sunday Balloting

Berlin, March 30.—Final returns from yesterday's presidential election in Germany, announced this morning, show that none of the seven candidates received a majority as required by the constitution, making a second election necessary. The second polling day has been fixed for April 26.

On this occasion the candidate having the highest number of votes will be elected.

The polling of the various candidates yesterday was as follows: Dr. Karl Jarres, candidate of the combined nationalist and conservative bourgeois parties, 1,365,323. Otto Braun, socialist, 7,735,678. Former Chancellor Marx, centrist, 3,833,678.

Ernst Thaelmann, communist, 1,869,553. Premier Heilmann of Baden, democratic party, 1,365,134. Dr. Held, Bavarian people's party, 1,003,274. General Ludendorff, fascist party, 234,471. Void ballots, 24,152.

The total vote, in excess of 26,812,000, is slightly 63 per cent of the qualified electorate.

The greatest gainers in the election were the socialists, who profited at the expense of the communists. Only at Halle, where the communists' campaign was inaugurated by a shooting affair at a mass meeting, were the communists the gainers, their vote there increasing 30 per cent over last December's parliamentary pollings.

On the face of the returns it would seem likely that the three middle parties—the socialists, centrists and democrats—could carry the second election if they combined on a common candidate, even if the vote which yesterday went to Dr. Held and General Ludendorff fall to the parties of the right.

OMAHA "Y" CAMP GETS HIGH RATING

The Omaha Y. M. C. A.'s boys' camp has been awarded Class A rating by the camp standardization committee of the national Y. M. C. A. council, which entitled the Omaha boys' camp to use the standard seal on its literature and to fly the Class A camp banner from the flag staff at camp Sheldon during its camp periods.

Class A camp rating means that the camp scored over 900 per cent out of a possible 1,000 last summer for the proper camp administration, leadership, a responsible committee in charge of the camp operation, health provisions, food and balanced menus, physical examination of campers, Bible study program, campfire and educational and woodcraft programs and sanitary arrangements.

Board of Education Abandons Complaint Lincoln, Neb., March 30.—The Omaha Board of Education will not appear before Governor McMullen in the interest of the Douglas county teachers' pension bill, which has passed both houses of the legislature and the governor's office today. Previously the board had voted opposition to the bill, introduced by Senator Douglas, which raised from \$500 to \$900 the amount to be used as a basis in figuring teachers' pensions.
