It will be a varied one, for McCormack likes songs from all nations, although he naturally has a preference for the Irish lyrics.

An interviewer recently asked him what songs he liked best to sing, and his reply was:

"I like a good song, no matter where it comes from, whether it is Russian, German, French, Italian, English or American. I have been criticized for singing too many light songs, but I have been criticized just as severely for not singing enough of them. My only rule is that a song must have some value, if it is only a bit of clean sentiment."

His concert will probably be the last important one of the season in Omaha, and it will, no doubt, be heard by a very large audience, for McCormack's popularity in America is probably greater than that of any other singer, and Omaha has waited several years for this concert.
