Applied Arts Exhibit.

Forming a part of the exhibition of Applied Arts opening in the galleries of the Public Library on Sunday April 5th is a small exhibit of pewter made by Lester Vaughan of Taunton, Mass.

Pewter was naturally associated with colonial times. Old candlesticks and platters survive to us despite the softness of the ware. The advantages of pewter have been recognized since antiquity. In composition it consists of tin and lead, with smaller amounts of copper, zinc, antimony or bismuth. Having no poisonous character it is suitable for table ware and it has the advantage of not tarnishing easily. The revival of its use in our day is very interesting. It is more sympathetic to the touch than silver, and possesses greater warmth and is of course very much cheaper. The shapes of the pieces here shown are particularly good—and show excellent taste and craftsmanship. A comfortably sized water pitcher shows a beautiful relation in the curves of spout and handle; its utilitarian aspects are enhanced by its good design.

Design in objects of use is emphasized by the Society of Fine Arts in presenting this exhibition. Pottery, textiles, and metal work are also features of a varied showing.
