



Bob Reagan, Ex-Notre Dame Center, Named Assistant Grid Coach at Creighton

Former Teammate of Chet Wynne; Reports in Fall

Coached Linemen at University of Utah Last Season—Will Have Charge of Bluejay Forward Wall.

By RALPH WAGNER. CREIGHTON'S football coaching staff has been enlarged to the extent of two new assistant grid mentors, namely Bob Reagan and Stewart Neary.

Announcement that Bob Reagan, former Notre Dame university center, had been secured to assist head coach Chet Wynne at Creighton next fall was made Saturday by A. A. Schabinger, athletic director for the Bluejays.

Reagan coached the University of Utah linemen last year and developed a squad of green material into one of the strongest lines in the western conference. For his work at Utah, Reagan was complimented by nearly every coach in the conference. It was his first year at coaching and he more than made a success.

In 1921, '22 and '23, Reagan played center on the Notre Dame university teams, and no less an authority on famous football than Knute Rockne, famous Notre Dame coach, says that Reagan is one of the best centers ever turned out at the South Bend school.

Chet Wynne, now head coach at Creighton and Reagan were teammates on the Notre Dame football team. Wynne is high in his praise of Reagan and is not a bit backward in informing the public that his new assistant is bound to be a success as line coach.

Reagan will report September 4. He will have charge of the linemen, while Stewart Neary, former Creighton athlete, will assist both Wynne and Reagan in their work.

The signing of Reagan—he has a one-year contract—is in keeping with the policy of Athletic Director Schabinger in enlarging the Creighton university coaching staff so that individual instruction may be given athletes competing for berths on Creighton teams.

Hear Coach Wynne and his assistants, Reagan and Neary, will be able to teach football to many Creighton gridsters next fall. Lloyd McGahan, freshman coach, will handle the "fresh" gridsters.

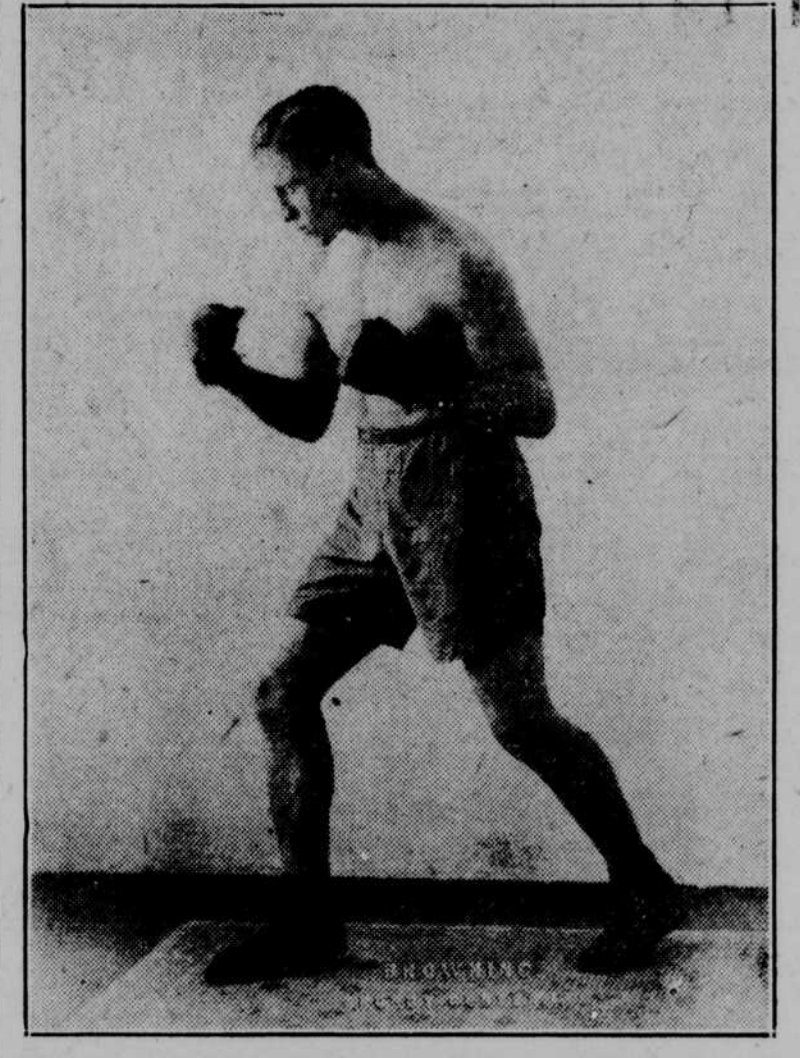

Badger Grid Coach Accepts Position at Northwestern

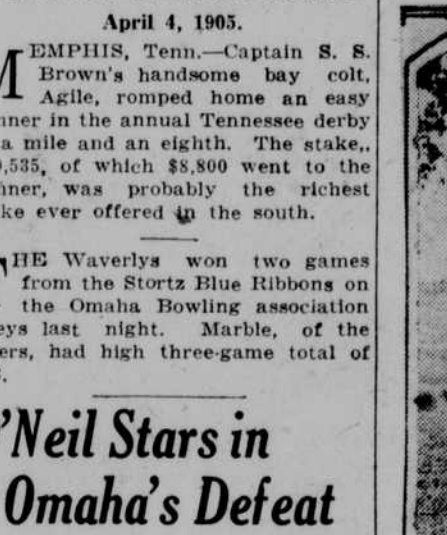

Naturally, after that, I went into the game as he had done.

I developed to perfection the scissors hold, which has been so valuable to me in my various contests. And I won a number of matches without great trouble.

"I think I can beat you in a finish match." He didn't think I could, so we walked out behind the bars on our farm and went to it. And after a hard tussle I downed him for what might be called the "family championship."

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When we resumed, I went at him hard. He got out of the scissors hold again, but finally, when we had been at it an hour and a half, I combined a half Nelson with a body scissors and he had to give in.

I felt the effects of that last hold considerably, although, when he came out for the second fall, he seemed strong. He secured the double wrist lock several times, but I always broke it. And 11 minutes after we started I got another body scissors hold and a full Nelson, tying him up with both elbows back of his head. That ended the battle.

I took down 25 per cent of the gate receipts and a side bet of \$300. From then on I met more important opponents. On July 4 of the following year, 1915, I won the world's championship from Charley Cutler at Omaha. The funny thing about it all was that the Omaha crowd believed Carpenter, or Santell, had laid down to me, and they made him get out of their city. They couldn't understand why he should have lost to a comparatively inexperienced youngster.
