

### Rehearsal Augurs Musical Treat to Symphony Patrons

#### Roentgen's Baton to Delight Omahans Who Hear Own Orchestra Friday Night.

Ernest Roentgen of Minneapolis has just that kind of eyes. It was another Roentgen who discovered those rays which enable one to take X-ray photographs—the kind you use when you want to locate things you've swallowed, or something like that.  
Ernest Roentgen has been rehearsing the Omaha Symphony orchestra, and will officiate as conductor at the orchestra's first public appearance Friday night, at the Auditorium. In the first place, Mr. Roentgen is a musician of international reputation. Secondly, he is an orchestral conductor of equally wide repute. That is why he was secured to rehearse and conduct Omaha's new orchestra of 60 pieces.  
And the statement that his eyes are that kind is based on the fact that he has seen right through the back of the music sheets of the musicians fronting him.

#### Work in Harmony.

Omaha musicians may be temperamental, and doubtless are. There may be artistic jealousies, as well as professional jealousies. But none of these things is visible to the naked eye or audible to the listening ear in this matter of a symphony orchestra composed of the leading musical artists of Omaha and Council Bluffs.  
All these things have been laid aside because of the unselfish desire to make for better things musically in this great community. The men and women who compose this orchestra have been giving freely of their time and talents for the sole purpose of elevating musical standards and thereby creating a desire for better music.  
"A fine body of musicians," declared Mr. Roentgen at the conclusion of Thursday's rehearsal. "Wonderful possibilities for a symphony orchestra that will not only be of great artistic service to Omaha and the middle west, but will also be a magnificent advertisement of Omaha's civic pride and spirit. I honestly assure the people of this city a great musical treat when this fine orchestra makes its initial public appearance."  
Special solos.

Special features of Friday night's program will include cello solos by Mr. Roentgen and vocal solos by Miss Velma Lois Sutton, coloratura soprano, who has delighted Omaha audiences by her brilliant work, and whose appearance with the symphony orchestra Friday night will give added emphasis to the claim that Omaha is the home of really great artists in music.  
The rehearsals of the orchestra have been marked by enthusiasm for excellence and permanency. The future of the organization does not depend upon the loyalty or artistry of its members, but upon the kind of support given it by Omahans. The measure of that loyalty may be taken by the patronage extended at the initial concert.

### Ship Board Calls Off Preferential Rail Rate Fight

#### Members Vote to Withdraw Certification That Shipping Facilities Warrant Application of Charges.

Washington, May 8.—The shipping board voted tonight to withdraw, without conditions, its certification to the Interstate Commerce commission that existing shipping facilities warranted application of the preferential rail rate provisions of the merchant marine act.  
The vote by which the board reversed its previous position in reference to section 28 of the merchant marine act was along party lines and was 4 to 3. Commissioners Thompson, Haney and Benson, the three democratic members, cast the dissenting ballots.  
Earlier in the day, the board had voted down, by a similar vote, the four republican members opposing a resolution by Commissioner Thompson to modify the board's original certification limiting the territorial and commodity ranges to which the preferential rates would be applied.  
Commissioner Thompson, in a statement after the final vote, de-

clared withdrawal of the application by a majority of the board "may stop forever the establishment of American flag preference, and for that reason is to be regretted deeply."

#### Alaska Primary Election Results May Be Contested

Juneau, Alaska, May 8.—Election results, by which it was announced adherents of President Coolidge had lost generally in Alaska primary and municipal elections April 29, will be contested, according to indications today. The ground of the fight will be that several hundred Indians, or native Alaskans, voted illegally.
