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## OLYMPIC PICTURES BY U. S. FORBIDDEN

Paris, May 8.—The breach between the American Olympic Rugby football team and the French Olympic committee over the refusal of the latter to permit the Americans to take their own pictures of the United States-Rumania match Sunday, remained unhealed today. Manager Samuel Goodman even threatening to abandon the game if the permission were not granted.

The French committee had previously let the photographic concession for the entire period of the Olympic games to a French company. A meeting has been called for Saturday between Manager Goodman, representatives of three leading American camera firms and two members of the French committee, at which an attempt will be made to iron out the difficulties.
