Peas and Shallots in Cream. Six shallots, two tablespoons butter, one-half cup water, one-half teaspoon salt, one teaspoon sugar, one pint peas, one cup white sauce.

Peel shallots and simmer in butter three minutes. Add water, salt and sugar, cover and cook 10 minutes. Add peas and cook 20 minutes or until tender. Then add white sauce and more seasoning if required.
