Museum Notes.

Agitation regarding the removal of Praxiteles' famous statue of Hermes from Greece to the United States appears to be ended. A number of museum directors, including Director Robinson of the American Academy in Rome, Italy, are directly opposed to its removal from the land of its origin. Praxiteles' "Hermes" is one of the most priceless heritages of Greece.

The art museum in Texas has recently opened in Houston. The opening address was given by Homer St. Gaudens, director of the Carnegie Institute, Pittsburgh. Coinciding with the opening of the first unit of the building came the announcement that 24 business men of Houston had contributed anonymously a sum totaling \$100,000 to construct the wings of the museum. James Chillum Jr., is director of the Houston Art gallery.

Some of the paintings of the southwest by Walter Ufer, now on exhibition in the galleries of the Society of Fine Arts have been transferred from the west to the east gallery to make room for an exhibition of the

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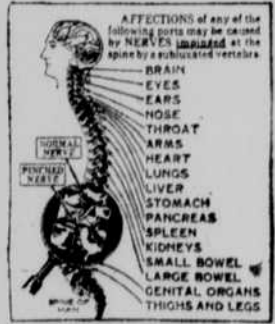
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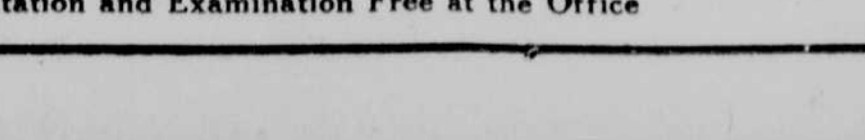
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
