Mickey Walker Successfully Defends Title in 10-Round Bout With Tendler

Champ Awarded **Decision After** Furious Battle

Challenger Puts Up Strong Fight but Was Outpunched in Infighting.

Philadelphia, June 2. - Mickey Walker of Elizabeth, N. J., world's welterweight champion, successfully defended his title against Lew Tendter, Philadelphia southpaw, in a furious 10-round bout in the National league ball park tonight. The challenger put up a strong fight against the youthful champion, but was out punched in the infighting.

Round One.

Walker got in the first blow, a hard right to Tendier's jaw. The southpaw was fighting purely a defensive fight. Walker was forcing the fighting, driving his challenger around the ring. Walker missed right uppercut and Tendier fell in a clinch. The champion was concentrating his attack to Tendier's body. Tendier's left found its way to Walker's jaw without a return. Tendier got over another good left but took a bad beating in the infighting that followed.

Round Two.

Walker drove Tendier to a neutral corner with a left, followed by a vicious right. Walker solled in with lefts and rights which forced Tendier into a clinch. Tendier got over a left to Walker's head and Walker missed a right in return. They met in a furious exchange of blows in the center of the ring. Tendier backed Walker up to the ropes with a left and followed with a right which drove the champion into a clinch.

Walker hit Tender in the jaw with a hard right and the southpaw fell into a clinch. He followed with another vicious right to the jaw. Walker was driving the challenger from rope to rope with a hard swinging attack. Walker scored heavily with two rights to the jaw and almost drove Tendier through the ropes. They were in a clinch at the beil.

Walker staggered Tendier with a straight right and the southpaw drove into a clinch. Walker scored heavily in the infighting. Tendier came in with a left which missed Walker's face and the champion countered with a hard right to the head, the best blow of the bout. Tendier was missing frequently. 
