

Abadane Wins Annual Running of Ak-Sar-Ben Queen's Plate at Fast Field

Jones Entry Finishes Second; Baker Third

C. B. Irwin Thoroughbred Comes Up From Fifth Position to Win by Nearly Two Lengths.

Abadane, 9-year-old son of Maboul II by Alby, flying the red and white silks of the C. B. Irwin stable and carrying jockey Paul Huns, yesterday before a large crowd won the fourth running of the Ak-Sar-Ben Queen's Plate at six furlongs.

The Queen's Plate was the feature race of the afternoon and to the winner went \$1,500 as prize money. Abadane, coupled with Chiva, were entered in the Irwin entry and were more than 3 to 1 in the betting. The Jones-Update entry of Second Thoughts and Go Foin, second choice in the betting, placed when the former finished one and one-half lengths behind honest Abadane.

Without a question the Queen's Plate was the most thrilling race ever seen at Ak-Sar-Ben track since the inauguration of the spring running meeting four years ago. The lead saw-sawed back and forth between The Araucanian and Second Thoughts until the field turned for home when Abadane the mighty, holder of the world's record for a mile and 40 yards, moved up fast and stride by stride won the leaders down until he had the lead to himself.

Abadane is a foreigner. He was born in France but received most of his race training on this side. He was brought to this country by a Philadelphia turfman and was later taken over and trained by the same man who brought Sarazen to the front. He was claimed by C. B. Irwin, the Cheyenne (Wyo.) horseman out of a claiming race for \$4,000 at age 2.

Abadane, track two years ago, during the first season at the Tajanna track Abadane not only set a world's record of 1:32.5 for a mile and a quarter, but won 11 straight races of his own. The son of Maboul II was shipped to Omaha last year and while here won the Ak-Sar-Ben King's derby.

He broke down after the race and did not run up to his regular form until yesterday when he stepped out and brought home the big end of the purse in the Queen's plate.
