Another long shot topped the third race at five and one-half furlongs when Slippery Smile with Jockey E. Neal in the saddle finished a scant nose to the good over Virgo. Emma Williams made a game try to take place money but was a neck short of second position at the wire.

## Wills-Madden Bout Due for Another Day

New York, June 5.—The Harry Wills-Bartley Madden heavyweight encounter, blocked for a variety of reasons here and in Newark since last February, may not be held, as planned, next Monday night at the Queensboro stadium, despite the 30-day permit granted the arena by the board of standards and appeals in reversing the fire department's condemnation order.

Members of the board of standards and appeals, however, insisted such endorsement was not necessary and pointed out that the delay evidently was caused by failure of the boxing board to get a copy of the resolution approving the arena. This, they said, would not be in the hands of the commission until next Thursday, so that another postponement of the bout seems inevitable.

## William Tilden, Net Association to Come to Terms

Providence, R. I., June 5.—A compromise whereby William T. Tilden and other tennis players-writers retain their amateur status, and which is expected to settle the controversy between the United States Lawn Tennis association and player-writers, was set forth here today by William T. Tilden, who is competing in the state tennis championship.

The compromise, it is understood, is acceptable to the U. S. L. T. A. Under its terms Mr. Tilden will be eligible to rejoin the United States Davis Cup team. It further provides that player-writers retain the right to write tennis articles provided that in daily reports of tournaments in which the player-writer is competing he shall use neither his name nor title.

Boston, June 5.—George W. Wightman, president U. S. Lawn Tennis association, refused to comment today upon the statement made by William T. Tilden in Providence. He said that he wished to make a more careful study of the statement before making any reply.

## WILLS-MADDEN BOUT ASSURED

New York, June 5.—The State Athletic commission today licensed the Queensborough A. C. to hold bouts in its Long Island City arena, thus removing the last obstacle in the way of the Wills-Madden heavyweight match scheduled for Monday night.

The license was issued by the commission upon receipt of an order from the fire department removing its ban on the big wooden structure as a fire hazard. The license is revocable, however, at the termination of a 30-day period unless a permanent permit is issued by the fire department.
