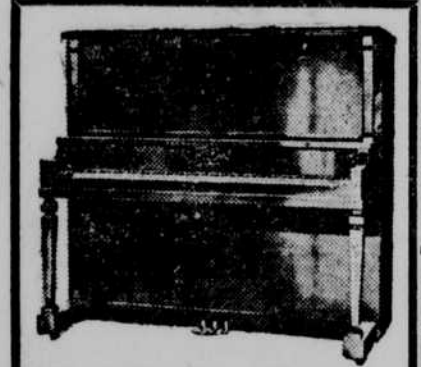


Tot Falls 30 Feet and Hits Walk of Cement; Is Bruised

Davenport street, Wednesday evening, landing on the cement sidewalk over 30 feet below with a thud that was audible to his father, George Arnold, who, with Mrs. Arnold, was dining in the room adjoining the one from which the boy fell.

Thursday morning, however, the baby was playing about his home again, with only three slight bruises on the side of his face to testify to his sudden descent. Friday he had quite forgotten the fall.

"I read in The Omaha Bee where three men fell from the fourth story of an elevator at Columbus," said the father. "One of them was killed and the other two all smashed up. My boy is starting out to be a world beater."

In his fall, the baby glanced off the shoulder of Ben Ross, a negro janitor, who was standing on the sidewalk below. The man thought someone had tossed a bundle of clothing out of an upper window, until he looked down at his feet and saw Joey in his little blue overalls.

Arnold on hearing the thud of the baby on the sidewalk, dashed into the bedroom. He found that the child in playing on the bed had pushed against the window screen, which had swung outward, allowing the baby to slip through.

"I went down those three floors in about three leaps," declared the father. "I got to the sidewalk just as the janitor was picking up Joe."

Dr. Andrew Dow, who examined the baby, found no injuries except the three slight scratches from the cement walk on the child's face.

Home Products Filling Market

Plums, Apricots and Gooseberries, New Fruits of Season.

By MARKET BASKET. Almost daily Mother Earth is contributing something in new fresh fruit or green vegetables which attracts the eyes of market shoppers.

Among the new fruits of the season are Roman Beauty California plums, apricots and gooseberries. Plums and apricots are selling for 45 cents a basket. Gooseberries retail at 15 cents a quart basket.

Cantaloupes, another favored fruit recently added to the fruit counters, can be had for 15 cents each or two for 25 cents. Large juicy oranges range in price from 25 to 39 cents a dozen. Apples are 30, 35 and 40 cents a dozen; bananas, 30 cents and 40 cents a dozen.

Missouri berries reign and continue to arrive in abundance. Canning of berries is urged now while they are cheap.

Although late in the season, the vegetable squares are gradually filling up with home-grown health foods. New home-grown cauliflower was the feature vegetable that captured the interest of Market Basket this week. It is selling for 15 cents a head.

Some home-grown tomatoes are also on the market, but sell for 25 cents a pound. Head lettuce is 10 and 15 cents a head. Red radishes are in abundance and sell for 1 cent a bunch. Iceberg radishes in large bunches can be purchased at five for 10 cents. Spinach is being sold by the peck at 10 cents; home-grown asparagus, three bunches for 25 cents; green onions, five bunches for 10 cents; home-grown turnips and beets are cheap at three bunches for 10 cents; rhubarb, two bunches for 5 cents. Old potatoes are gradually clearing out and are being replaced by the new.

In one market hundreds of cans of canned goods, including fruits, vegetables and California olives, which regularly sell for 40 and 50 cents a can, are being sold at three cans for 75 cents.

A very tempting display of pot roasts at 16 cents a pound was seen in one market. Spring chickens are also becoming more plentiful. Anything in the beef line is excellent during the summer months, as all beef is corned. For the sandwiches, Milwaukee meat wurst, a fine chop pork sausage, makes excellent fillers. Smoked sturgeon sells for 37 1/2 cents a pound and is especially suitable for the luncheon. Among fresh fish, hulleads are plentiful at 30 cents a pound.
