

# Twentieth Annual State Golf Meet Opens at Lincoln Country Club Monday

## Outstaters Will Endeavor to Cop Title From Omaha

Thirty-Four Clubs Will Participate in Tourney—Corrugated, Rib-Faced Clubs Will Be Barred.

INCOLN, Neb., June 7.—The cream of Nebraska golfers gathered here Monday for the twentieth annual state golf tournament to be played over the Lincoln Country club courses.

A big effort has been made among the outstate clubs to groom some player capable of putting the bee on Omaha's straight run of championships. As this writing it is entirely probable that such a thing may come to pass, but hardly possible.

Sam Reynolds, present state champion, will be just as tough as ever. But even if he should falter, the Omaha delegation will be so strong that some other member of the Gate City's entry list will step into the breach, the forecasters insist.

There were but three outstaters who qualified in the first flight last year at Omaha and they fell in the first round. One of those, Phil Atkin, Lincoln, is attending Harvard and will not compete.

Archie Bradstreet, Grand Island, carries the Third City's hopes. He got into the first flight last year. The other first flighter in 1923 was Dr. L. L. Nelson of Norfolk. He may get the feel of his clubs and go places. Both Bradstreet and Nelson will be here.

Looks like Joe Tucker, present city champion, as his best bet. There are others who may place well up in the list. They include Jack Whitten, university golfer and runner-up in last year's city tournament, and Willard Folsom, many times city champion.

There is always the possibility of a "dark horse" making a specialty when the length of the entry list is considered. More golfers, without question, will try for places in the different flights this year than ever before. There are 34 clubs now members of the state association, the last two to join being Council Bluffs and Lakoma of Omaha. This tops all previous mark for the state.

## Grab and Villa Feature Week's Fistic Dish

Middleweight Boss to Fight Martin Burke and Flyweight Champ Bud Taylor.

WO champions, supreme in their respective divisions of fistiana, and one of the leading contenders for Jack Dempsey's crown will headline this week's fistic program. Harry Grab, middleweight king, will meet Martin Burke, a light-heavyweight for 10 rounds in Cleveland; Pancho Villa, flyweight champion, will clash with Bud Taylor, the Terro Haute "terror," for 12 sessions in a Brooklyn arena; and Harry Wells, persistent challenger for the heavyweight title, will meet Bartley Madden, in that often postponed scrap in New York, unless there is another 11th hour hitch in the deal.

Grab's title will not be at stake because his foe is not able to make the middleweight limit, while Villa is in danger of losing his title providing Taylor can reduce to the flyweight limit, which he has been able to do on former occasions.

Of the two bouts it appears that Villa has much the more serious opposition as Burke cannot be expected to have a great deal of luck against a man of Grab's ability. Burke is a good fighter but reverses are sprinkled through his record that show plainly that he is not the leader of the challengers for the titles now held by Gene Tunney and Mike McTigue in the light-heavyweight section.

There is considerable interest in fistic centers in the contest between Villa and Taylor. The Terro Haute youngster is the lad who boxed Frankie Jerome when the latter was killed in New York. He has fought a flock of good men at his weight and in the bantam division with marked success. Included in this list are Charlie Rosenberg, Harry Gordon, Johnny Sheppard, Pat Moore, Frankie Genaro, Tommy Murphy, Hilly Divil, Jimmy Kelly, Benny Vogel, Frankie Mason, Babe Asher, Harold Smith and Eddie Santry.

The only setback in the career of Taylor was a knockout administered by Jimmy Kelly in 1923 but the following year he fought Kelly 10 rounds in a no-decision battle. Much is expected of the youngster by his admirers and he will have a chance to show his true worth against the Filipino mite, who is all that can be expected of a leader of any pugilistic class.

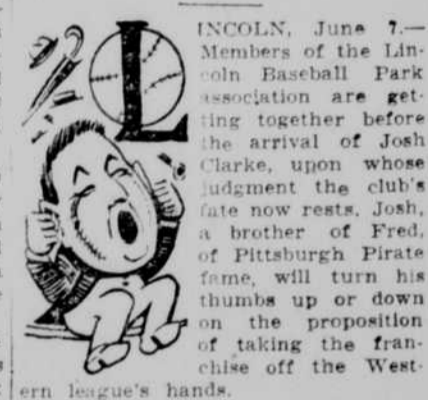

## League Head Says Backers Should Pay

Wakefield Leaves Considerable Indebtedness in His Wake—Clarke May Take Solons.



INCOLN, June 7.—Members of the Lincoln Baseball Park association are getting together before the arrival of Josh Clarke, upon whom judgment the club's fate now rests. Josh, a brother of Fred, the Pittsburgh Pirate fame, will turn his thumbs up or down on the proposition of taking the franchise off the Western league's hands.

Fred Clarke has been interested in the Lincoln club since it was first installed here. He made a bid for the franchise last winter but at that time Howard Wakefield had an option on it.

His plan is, provided he buys the franchise, to put his brother, Josh, at the helm and install Chick Fraser, veteran major league pitcher, as the guiding light on the field.

Josh is now enroute to Lincoln from the west coast. He is expected to arrive here Sunday.

When Wakefield tossed in the sponge and quit, he left behind him considerable indebtedness, the bulk of which was incurred expanding the seating capacity at Landis field. There are also innumerable other bills, in all amounting to several thousand dollars.

President Tearney has voiced the sentiment that Lincoln should absorb this indebtedness through its park association which subscribed \$20,000 for the purchase of Landis field.

Stockholders of the association feel altogether differently. They feel that Lincoln has met every obligation in good faith; that President Tearney promised a man financially responsible as a manager and that the Capital city should not be held for the league head's obvious error.

Provided the Clarke brothers decide to take over the franchise it would not only be a big help to the Lincoln club but it would add prestige to the entire league.

O'Neill Prepares for Race Meet  
O'Neill, Neb., June 7.—A large force of carpenters and mechanics will begin work Monday at O'Neill fair grounds, enlarging the grandstand and erecting bleachers and additional stands in preparation for the three days running race meet, July 24-26, the week following the close of the big Omaha meet now in session.

## Description of State Tourney Golf Course

No. 1—300 yards with par four; blind hole; players tee off down hill with green slope 250 yards with par four; sports short hole. Players forced to shoot up hill. The green is on a slope.

No. 2—400 yards with par four; one of the best greens on opposite hill. Sloping fairly to left. Slight hook lands on the trap and a hole is made. A nice means of out of bounds over the fence.

No. 3—595 yards with par four; large water hazard. Gopher must clear water hole, wood alone and one crossing water; fairway rolls to the right with a slope more dangerous than a hook. Green on a slope.

No. 4—411 yards with par three; pine tree takes accurate shot to reach the green, which is trapped in front and back. Pond water to receive ball hook slice out of bounds at right.

No. 5—252 yards with par four; water hole in front of tee. No green. Tee on a slope.

No. 6—440 yards with par four; dog leg; two shot hole before reaching the green. Tee on a slope. Fairway to right. Hole on a slope.

No. 7—525 yards with par five; uphill green. Tee on a slope. Fairway to right. Hole on a slope.

## Western League HIGHLIGHTS

WITH break deliveries for Western league pitchers banned, strikers are less numerous and consequently it is harder for a pitcher to get a no-decision.

In spite of this, Tex Crosby, veteran Tulsa backstop, registered 829 putouts for his season's work in 1922, being the second ever to cross the 800 mark in the Western.

The league record of 883, established by Miller of Sioux City in 1910, never has been approached. Furthermore, Miller piled up his record in only 132 games. Freeman struck out 246 for him that year and Marty O'Toole, the \$22,000 leonard, howled over 207. Wilson was another member of his staff who whiffed more than 200 that year.
