Rhubarb Time.

To four cups of rhubarb that have been cut into tiny pieces, add the juice and grated rind of one lemon and three and one-half cups of sugar. Cook this slowly for half an hour or a little more when it will be clear and tender. Pour into glasses and seal with paraffine.

Strawberry and Rhubarb Marmalade.

Six cups of rhubarb, washed, peeled and cut into inch pieces; two cups of pineapple (diced), two oranges and one lemon (finely minced), four cups of sugar and two cups of white corn syrup.

Rhubarb Pie.

Two cups of rhubarb, one cup of sugar, yolks of two eggs, one teaspoonful of butter and one tablespoonful of flour. Mix and cook slowly until like jelly. Put into a cooked pastry shell and cover with meringue made of the whites of the eggs beaten stiff with two tablespoonfuls of sugar. Brown slightly in the oven.

Orange Short Cake De Luxe

Orange short cake, unlike strawberry or peach short cakes, which may be had only during the summer when the latter fruits are ripe, may be made every day in the year.

To make, take oranges, sugar, two cups flour, five level teaspoons baking powder, one level teaspoon salt, six level teaspoons shortening, half to three-quarters cup milk, half pint jar heavy cream, one-third cup powdered sugar, half teaspoon vanilla, butter.

Wipe as many oranges as you care to use. Pare with a small sharp knife, removing white membrane with the skin, then remove sections free from membrane. Sprinkle with one tablespoonful sugar for each orange used and put in ice box or cold place. Put into flour sifter flour, baking powder, salt and one level tablespoon sugar and sift together twice. Add shortening and rub in lightly with the fingers. Add milk just enough to make a soft dough. Put into a greased cake pan and bake 12 to 15 minutes in a hot oven. Beat heavy cream until stiff, adding slowly the powdered sugar and vanilla. Split

short cake, place lower half on serving dish and spread generously with butter, cover with orange sections drained from juice and whipped cream. Place other half of short cake above the fruit, spread with butter, cover with orange sections, and garnish with whipped cream forced through pastry bag and tube and with sections of orange. Serve the orange juice separately as a sauce.
