Museum Notes

Decorative painting has a particular charm of its own and that charm is happily demonstrated in the exhibition of house beautiful cover designs and French railroad posters now on exhibition in the galleries of the public library. The simplification of forms and the generous play of imagination in these designs give them a special appeal. The exhibition remains here one week, closing tomorrow. The galleries are open as usual until 9 o'clock in the evening on week days and from 2 until 6 o'clock on Sunday afternoons. The hours will continue until the end of June.

The next exhibition to be presented by the Society of Fine Arts is of textiles, including some very rare old specimens, Coptic pieces from the third to the fifth centuries, early Turkish and Arabian pieces, Italian and French textiles from the 15th century on. There will be Peruvian specimens of the period after the Spanish invasion, besides a number of very fine oriental examples. This exhibition scheduled for the last three weeks in June, will be the final one of the season.

A beautiful addition to the Antique collection started during the past winter is the gift to the society of a Greek vase of the Sixth century B. C. It is of the earliest period of Greek vase painting, preceding the red and black specimens which are much more numerous. Like the small figurine of a seated woman, which is now part of the collection, this vase was in the private collection of Mr. Schliemann and remained in his library until the time of his death. This generous gift was made by Mr. Joseph Brummer of New York on hearing of the pleasure which the exhibition of last January gave the people of Omaha. The body of the vase is of a buff color with decorations painted in black. The subject is a characteristic one of warriors with shields, spears and horses. It may be seen in the case of antiquities in the east gallery.
