

American Singer Scores Triumph in London Show

Mary Lewis, Replacing National Opera Company Star, Appears in "Tales of Hoffman."

London, June 13.—Newspapers today commented upon the success achieved by Mary Lewis, formerly a Little Rock (Ark.) singer, who is making her first appearance in England. She sang last night in "Tales of Hoffman" at His Majesty's theater when a sudden indisposition prevented the appearance of Maggie Teyte, British national opera company star. The American singer's performance pleased the critics.

New York, June 13.—Miss Mary Lewis, the young American singer, who scored success in a London recital last night, sang in Ziegfeld's Follies from 1920 to 1922. She also scored a triumph last fall in Vienna, where she was acclaimed by some critics as "greater than Jeriza."

Little Rock, Ark., June 13.—Mary Lewis, who has achieved success in London as a singer, was born in Dallas, Tex., but lived in Little Rock for some years and was educated here. She went from Little Rock to California and then to New York.

Tornado Sweeps Three Ranches

Buildings Demolished and Livestock Killed in Storm Near Wood Lake.

Wood Lake, Neb., June 13.—A tornado swept a strip of territory about a half-mile wide and 20 miles long south of here Wednesday night.

The storm passed over the Paul Hoef's ranch, 14 miles south of Wood Lake, destroyed a large, modern barn and tore away about one-half of the house. All corrals, fences and small buildings also were destroyed. Debris was scattered over three miles away. One horse and several head of sheep and hogs were killed at the ranch. Mr. Hoef's was in town at the time with a shipment of hogs. Insurance was carried on the buildings.

The storm also hit the Lena Shaul ranch and tore down a shed and windmill. Proceeding eastward, the tornado twisted the house part way around on the old Butterfield ranch, now occupied by Charles O'Connor.

There may be other buildings damaged, but reports have been slow coming in on account of the damage to the wire in that vicinity. Another tornado passed northeast of here. Several cars of tourists on the road from Ainsworth stopped about a mile east of town and watched the funnel-shaped cloud for over 20 minutes. It appeared to them to be about 20 to 40 miles away.

Ambrose, formerly of the government petroleum service, were examined during the forenoon today.

Mr. Richards was the oldest of seven children and resided with his mother, Mrs. L. A. Richards, on a ranch near Albuquerque. His wife died several years ago.
