

Mysterious Fund Bobs Up to Help Girl-Bride-Forger

Dorothy Miller La Rue May Be Paroled to Girls' Home When Checks Are Made Good.

Dorothy Miller La Rue, bride-of-a-day of Gene La Rue, who has been in the city detention home for two months on charges of forgery, is entitled to restitution rights, according to her attorney, and an effort will be made to place her in the Good Shepherd Home for Girls for two years, instead of in the state penitentiary.

Paul I. Manhart, the attorney, after many efforts to secure funds from relatives for bond or to take up the forged checks, was notified by an Omaha bank that \$250 was put to his account recently.

No knowledge has been obtained as to who placed the money in the bank. The girl's brother, Frank Miller, wrote her attorney from Cristobal, Canal Zone, that he was unable to furnish funds. Her sister, Mrs. C. Hickey of Milwaukee, was also unable to send any money.

Hopes To Clear Debts. With the \$250 in the bank, the attorney offered to pay the charge of \$175 filed as debt through the forged check by Burgess-Nash company.

The large sum that Dorothy forged in checks signed by Art Nedrow, farmer of Stella, Neb., whom she is said to have promised to marry, has not been enumerated in charges against her. When Nedrow was questioned by Dorothy's attorney, he declared that he would never file charges and would never appear in court against her, unless forced to do so.

"I would never harm the kid," he told the attorney. "I thought lots of her."

New Charges Hinted. But when Judge Fitzgerald consulted the county attorney's office as to parole, Dan Gross, assistant county attorney, stated that Harris-Goss company had expressed desire to file charges against her for alleged forgery of check for \$250 against the company. Additional charges would prevent parole of Dorothy to the home.

Annulment of the marriage, which will cost \$25, is also sought. Harris-Goss company had already filed petition in Falls City, Neb., against the State bank of Stella for payment of the \$250 check which the bank had stated was good at time of payment.

Relatives of Dorothy are bringing pressure to bear on her attorney for her release from the detention home.

La Rue's second wife is employed at the Herman Kiefer hospital at Detroit, according to word received here. There is a child by this marriage, six 1/2 the old. A picture that resembled La Rue, that of Rod La Rocque, the motion picture actor, was sent to Omaha police by the second wife.

Resemblance Won Dorothy. La Rue won the heart of Dorothy Miller La Rue, his third wife, by his resemblance to La Rocque.

Dorothy was adopted by the Manhart family in Panama, Ia., when she was 5, said her attorney. With her sister, then 7, she was brought to that town for adoption. The family that had planned to adopt Dorothy failed to do so, and to prevent the little girl being returned to an institution in Davenport, Ia., the Manhart boys kept her at their home. They became so attached to Dorothy that she became their ward.

Met Nedrow at Auburn. She was brought up the family as a sister, educated at an academy in Kansas and later to a nurse's training course. While performing her duties as nurse at Auburn, Neb., Art Nedrow fell in love with her.

Dorothy has promised her attorney if she is placed in the Good Shepherd home instead of the penitentiary she will reform. The case against her is her first offense. She is a motor when arrested. She celebrated her 19th birthday in the detention home on June 10.

"Charley" Dawes Accepts Invitation of The Omaha Bee to Fire First Guns of His Campaign in Nebraska

"Would Seem Natural to Scrap in That Territory," He Wires—Great Welcome Planned.

At the invitation of The Omaha Bee, Charles G. Dawes will open his campaign for vice president in Nebraska.

Lincoln, his old home town, will be the scene for the firing of this historic opening gun. At Lincoln he will be able to see a lot of old-time friends and hear them yell "Attaboy, Charley!" as he outlines the issues of the campaign as he views them.

People of Lincoln who remember the "Charley" Dawes of the old days know that any scrap he starts is going to be a lively one while he lasts, and the one to be started when he comes to town some time early in July promises to be the kingpin of all political scraps.

General Dawes will receive official notice of his nomination at his home in Evanston, surrounded by his friends and neighbors of that Chicago suburb. His speech of acceptance will be a formal pronouncement.

But after the notification the famous down-draft pipe will be stoked up, the Prince Albert coat and starched collar laid aside, and Dawes will prepare for the opening of the big scrap in the old home town.

Lincoln Plans Welcome. It is easy to imagine what Lincoln will be all dressed up like a circus parade, and O street will be cluttered with flags and banners and shouting, shrieking, milling, perspiring, happy humanity, gathered from all sections of Nebraska.

Once a nominee for president was officially notified at Lincoln, and the event brought together a great crowd. But Lincoln says, "You just wait till Charley Dawes comes over to the old town to fire the opening gun of his campaign!"

General Dawes will stop over in Omaha on his way to Lincoln, and while there, auto horns, bands and cheers will inform him he is welcome back to the old home state.

General Dawes will make a political speech on that occasion. But Democrats, progressives, farmer-laborites, and independents will crowd up to hear him, knowing that he will say something worth while and eager to show that they are proud of their former Nebraska friend and neighbor.

Now that it is definitely known that General Dawes has accepted the invitation of The Omaha Bee to open his campaign in Nebraska, committees on arrangements will be organized and nothing left undone to make his homecoming something that he and a million or more Nebraskans will never forget.

Mail Theft Gang Leader Sought

Confession of Suspect Leads Up Puzzle of \$3,000,000 Robbery.

Chicago, June 19.—Search for the "master mind" who planned the hold-up of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul mail train near here a week ago when eight bandits obtained \$2,975,000 in cash and securities, extends throughout the country today, while federal authorities prepare evidence for the grand jury against four men in custody.

Max Greenberg, former leader of "Egan's Rats" of St. Louis, Mo., who proposed the robbery at East St. Louis, according to the investigators, is at large. Ernest Fontano, Chicago; Samuel Grant, escaped life term from the Huntsville, Tex., penitentiary, and Blackie Wilcox, also an escaped Texas convict, are wanted as the remainder of the band, which police believe were implicated in recent mail robberies at Harvey, Ill., and Indiana Harbor.

Confessions solving the robbery have been obtained from three of the four alleged actual participants under arrest, police say. Willis Newton, Joe Newton and William Newton, seriously wounded during the robbery, all brothers, and Carlo Fontano, brother of Ernest, are held.

A federal warrant charging James Murray, politician, with being an accessory to the robbery, was issued last night. His bonds were fixed at \$100,000.

Slain Felon's Pal Gets Year in Pen; He and Wife Faint

Burglar's Widow Paroled to Police Matron With Mate of Sentenced Man.

As sentence of one year in the state reformatory was passed upon Joe Fox, 27, in district court Thursday afternoon, Edith Fox, his wife, fainted, falling heavily on the court room floor before attaches could catch her.

Fox himself crumpled up in a faint over the rail before the judge's bench.

Agnes Mansel, widow of the slain burglar, who fainted in municipal court when arraigned, showed no sign of emotion.

The two women, who, with Fox, were charged with conspiracy to commit a felony, were paroled to "Mother" Gibbons, police matron. All three pleaded guilty to the charge.

A letter from W. W. McMahon, city attorney, Hammond, Ind., the home of the Foxes, was read in court. McMahon declared that Fox was a "fine fellow with a splendid reputation." A clipping, detailing his summons recently to Chicago to be decorated by the French government for bravery during service overseas, was included in the letter. Fox, because he could not leave his restaurant long enough to make the trip, had to refuse the decoration.

Fox will be started to the reformatory Friday. His health forbids his detention in the county jail. He is a victim of tuberculosis as the result of a mustard gas eaten long ago.

Mrs. Fox and Mrs. Mansel announced that they would work to have Fox paroled. Mrs. Mansel wore a trim suit and black veil in court.

The three calmly pleaded guilty when their case was called at 2 Thursday afternoon. They stood stiffly erect before Judge Fitzgerald as he pronounced sentence. As the verdict was given, Mrs. Fox shuddered slightly and without a sound toppled over. Fox half turned in time to see his wife fall then fainted himself, crashing against the bar. Both were revived by court officers.
