Leopold Reported to Have Planned County Jail Break

Seven Prisoners Sent to Another Prison Following Discovery of Plot Hatched by Young Slayer.

Chicago, June 27.—Seven young prisoners, convicted as holdup men were sent from the county jail here today to the prison at Pontiac and visitors were limited and closely watched following discovery, according to a guard, of a plot to liberate by wholesale Cook county prisoners, including Nathan F. Leopold, jr., who is said to have supplied the brains for the plot.

Leopold, who, with Richard Loeb, is held on charges of having kidnaped and murdered 13-year-old Robert Franks, led the first intimation of the plot leak out when he chanced a remark to a visitor that it would be easy to escape from the jail. Restlessness apparent among prisoners also aroused the warden and eyesdroppers were set up among them. One of the stickup men finally admitted the plot, it was said, after repeated questioning.

Cass County Conventions Meet Today at Atlantic

Atlantic, Ia., June 27.—Cass county conventions, both republican and democratic, will be held here Saturday, as provided by the Iowa primary law. The democrats will elect seven delegates to the state convention, to be held at Des Moines July 25. The republicans will name 18 delegates to the state convention, to be held at Des Moines July 22.

Child Struck by Auto.

Beatrice, Neb., June 27.—Merlin Spencer, 5, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clark Spencer of Pickrell, was struck by an auto on the main street of Pickrell and sustained a fracture of an arm and contusions about the head. It is said the lad ran directly in front of the car in attempting to cross the street.

Harvard Man Wins Cup as Champion Drummer at G. A. R. Encampment

Harvard, Neb., June 27.—Griff J. Thomas, civil war drummer boy, who is prominent in G. A. R. activities, was acclaimed champion drummer boy of the G. A. R. encampment at Janesville, Wis., according to ditty patches in several Wisconsin dailies which have been exhibited here. An engraved cup was presented Mr. Thomas for this distinction. The veteran, formerly lived in Berlin, Wis., and who was the earliest department commander of Wisconsin, was for a long time postmaster and editor of the Harvard Courier.

Wife Sued for Divorce Has Husband Arrested

Fairbury, June 27.—Oklahoma and Nebraska may have difference of opinion over whether George L. Biser of Fairbury shall go to Oklahoma to answer for wife desertion or not. Biser has sued his wife, Mayola, for divorce. She has obtained a warrant in Oklahoma for Biser, charging him with wife desertion. Biser was arrested here and was immediately released on a writ of habeas corpus. It is reported a sheriff is coming from Oklahoma with a requisition for Biser, who will resist extradition.

First Sheel Creek Valley Settler, A. A. Strand, Dies

Albion, Neb., June 27.—Andres Anderson Strand, one of the oldest settlers of Boone county and the first in the Shell Creek valley, died Thursday. He came from Norway with his family in 1870, settling first in Wisconsin and coming to Boone county in 1872. He leaves four children. Isaac McHenry, for 20 years a resident of Boone county, died at his home southeast of Albion Sunday. He is survived by his wife and six children.

Crops Destroyed by Hail in Strip Five Miles Long

Syracuse, Neb., June 27.—Heavy hail and rainstorm swept the Osage neighborhood south of this place Thursday morning. Over a strip approximately five miles long and in some places two miles wide hail destroyed all crops. Over a good portion of this area wheat is a total loss and corn and gardens pounded into the ground. The rain sent Muddy creek out of bounds, adding to the damage. The loss will amount to thousands of dollars.

Baby Drowns in Tank.

Aurora, Neb., June 27.—Mabel Edna Green, baby daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ora Green, living five miles northeast of Aurora, fell into a water tank Friday evening and was drowned.
