Arrangements Completed for New Night Service Starting July 1.

New York, June 27 .- The 35-hour ervice will start July 1, when six planes at different points across the and relay mail between this city and San Francisco, it was announced today by Postmaster Edward M. Mer

While the present cross-country all mail service is made in 35 flying hours, the service is halted during the night, so that delivery actually takes four days. All arrangements have been completed, Mr. Morgan said, and service will be maintaine daily throughout the year.

Any mailable matter will be carried by airplanes, including sealed parcels not exceeding 50 pounds in weight and not exceeding 84 inches in length and width combined. Postage is at the rate of 8 cents an ounce for each

There are four relay stops between here and San Francisco and 15 delivery stops. Further deliveries are nade by dropping mail sacks from the plane. Each plane carries about 600 pounds of mail and there will be

bout 40 planes in the service. The schedule is so arranged all of the night flying will take place etween Chicago and Cheyenne, Wyo. and this stretch has been equipped with a string of guide lights.

The stops made by the mail planes re New York, Bellefonte, Pa.; Cleveand, Bryan, O.; Chicago, Iowa City, maha, North Platte, Cheyenne, Rawlins, Rock Springs, Salt Lake City, Elko and San Francisco.
