Omaha Trims Solons in First Game by 7 to 3 Score and Second by Count of 7 to 2; Play Again Today.

SOMETHING like 4,000 spectators, some for and some against the Buffaloes, were on hand at Fifteenth and Vine streets Sunday afternoon when the Omaha Buffaloes won their ninth and tenth straight victories by trouncing the lowly Lincoln Solons in a brace of contests by the scores of 7 to 3 and 7 to 2.

By virtue of their victories and Des Moines and Denver splitting a couple of games in Des Moines yesterday, the Buffaloes still occupy the top round of the percentage ladder.

Sundays' pair of wins came about as the result of good pitching on the part of Bailey in the first and Joe Daily in the second and the opportune hitting of each an every member of the league leaders. The pitching handed out by the Solon hurlers wasn't good enough to check the slugger Buffaloes and after the early innings of both games the herd was never in danger of losing its lead.

During the 16 innings the Buffaloes were at bat they collected 24 hits, of which four were home runs, two triples, eight doubles and the remainder just common ordinary single base hits. The Solons hit well in the first game, getting 12 hits off Bailey, but in the second Daily kept his knuckles to himself and allowed the visitors only five catted singles during the nine innings.
