W. G. McAdoo Fall Behind Smith First Time Youth Loses in Battle

Californian, Dropping to 353, Loses Power of **Veto Over Convention**

Madison Square Garden, New York, July 7.—Governor Smith passed William G. McAdoo tonight in the 86th ballot. forces and the anti-McAdoo coalition crashed down blocks of McAdoo votes on succeeding ballots at the night session until McAdoo, who started the convention with a lead of almost 200 over the New York governor, was running behind him. Besides that, McAdoo has lost his power of a one-third veto over the convention.

The summary of the 86th ballot follows: Smith, 360; McAdoo, 353.5; Ralston, 92; Glass, 72.5; Herriot Asks English Premier

Madison Square Garden, New York. July 7 .- Launch-Ing a night attack on the McAdoo lines, the Smith forces and their co-belligerents at tonight's session of the democratic national convention hammered Mr. McAdoo's ballot to a new low record—the lowest point it has touched since the opening of the convention.

Calvin Coolidge, Jr., Succumbs After All Artificial Means of Preserving Life Exhausted-Sufferer Remains Conscious Almost Up to Time of Death.

Washington, July 7.—Calvin Coolidge, jr. son of the president, died tonight at Walter Reed hospital of blood poisoning.

The end came after the boy had battled with the utmost bravery and fortitude for five days against a disease which had racked his body with pain and sapped the reserve strength of his frail constitution.

Washington, July 7.—Calvin Coolidge, jr., son of the president and Mrs. Coolidge, is dying. His final collapse began at 7:55 tonight.

After a vain battle all day and for several previous, his physicians were forced to announce that death was rapidly approaching. The tenacity with which he had fought his battle, however, left it problematical as to how many minutes or hours he might live.

Blood poisoning, from which he has been suffering for week or more, finally gained the upper hand late today, when all artificial means of preserving life were exhausted. He remained conscious almost throughout. President
