W. G. McAdoo Falls Behind Smith First Time

Californian, Dropping to 353, Loses Power of Veto Over Convention

Governor's Forces and Allies, in Whirlwind Attack, Cut Ex-Secretary's Vote From 200 Lead Once Held to Second Place—Smith, However, Fails to Gain.

Ralston in Third Place With 92; Glass Fourth

Madison Square Garden, New York, July 7.—Governor Smith passed William G. McAdoo tonight in the 86th ballot. In a whirlwind attack on the McAdoo lines, the Smith forces and the anti-McAdoo coalition crashed down blocks of McAdoo votes on succeeding ballots at the night session until McAdoo, who started the convention with a lead of almost 200 over the New York governor, was running behind him.

The summary of the 86th ballot follows: Smith, 360; McAdoo, 353.5; Ralston, 92; Glass, 72.5; Davis, 65.5.
