**Commissioners' Proceedings.**

[OFFICIAL—BY AUTHORITY.]

McCook, Nebraska, October 5th, 1897.  
Board of county commissioners met in regular session. Present, Stephen Bolles and Jas. A. Robinson, commissioners, and R. A. Green, county clerk. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.  
Petition of Geo. B. Morgan, T. F. McDonald et al. asking for the location of a public road and considered; the board find that all requirements of law have been fully complied with and that the public good requires the opening of said road. On motion petition is granted establishing a public road as follows, to-wit: Commencing on section line north of section Nineteen, town, One, Range Twenty-seven, forty rods west of northeast corner of said section, then to run south to intersect with Granville avenue in town of Danbury. Said road to be sixty feet wide; and clerk directed to draw warrants on road district #1 in payment of damages allowed as follows:  
C. Wise, \$20 W. H. Harrison, \$20  
Upon the petition of W. B. Murphy, J. S. Gielday et al., and due investigation the board find that the public good requires the opening of a public road as follows: Commencing at southeast corner Section Nine, Town, Two, Range Twenty-six; then running east on section line four miles and terminating at southeast corner section 12 on county line. On motion same is declared a public road and clerk directed to notify overseers of highways to open same and to notify owners of land along line of said road to file claims for damages by reason of the location thereof on or before Monday, December 6th, 1897, or no further action will be taken thereon.
