A Few Crop Reports.

This week, instead of giving our readers reports of crops grown by individual farmers, we present a few neighborhood reports for which we are indebted to Joseph Walkington of North Valley precinct, J. P. Kinney of Lebanon precinct, and O. L. Thompson of Gerver precinct, each one reporting for nine sections or 5,660 acres.

Mr. Walkington reports 1,985 acres in cultivation upon which was grown 4,776 bushels of wheat, 27,400 bushels of corn, 2,000 bushels of oats, 900 bushels of rye thousand four hundred and eighty-one dollars worth of hogs were sold and \$216 worth of cattle. On January 1, 1898, the same territory had 555 head of hogs and 71 head of cattle. Winter wheat averaged 24 bushels per acre, spring wheat 16, oats 35, rye 15, and corn about 20, This is in the northeast corner of the county.

Mr. Kinney reports 2,340 acres in cultivation, 137 acres in native hay and 267 in alfalfa. There were grown in this territory 5,050 bushels of wheat, 46,400 bushels of corn, 493 bushels of oats, 1,750 bushels of rye, 250 tons of native hay and 468 tons of alfalfa. January 1. 1897, there were on hand 692 hogs and 82 head of cattle.
