ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION.
Know all men by these presents: That we, W. S. Perry, J. A. Gunn, C. E. Pope, J. F. Kenyon and Frank Carruth do associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming and becoming a corporation in the State of Nebraska for the transaction of the business hereinafter described:

(1) The name of this corporation shall be the McCook Lead and Zinc Mining Company. The principal place of transacting its business shall be in McCook, Red Willow county, Nebraska.

(2) The nature of the business shall be the purchasing, leasing, sub-leasing, and selling mining lands and properties; the exploring and promoting of mining properties and companies; and any and all kinds of mines and mining; the acquiring of such real estate as shall be for the interest of the corporation, either by purchase, lease or otherwise; the purchase and sale of mining materials and machinery; the erection and maintenance of such one-half mile between sections 9 and 16; and further to vacate the road beginning at said southwest corner of the northwest quarter of said section 9 and running east one-half mile and thence south one-half mile, and all objections thereto or claims for damages must be filed in the court clerk's office on or before noon of the 30th day of July, A. D. 1900, or said road will be established without reference thereto.
