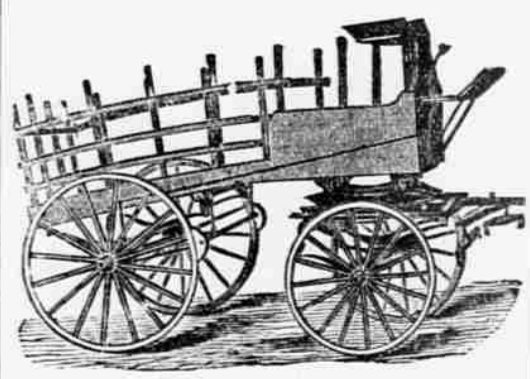

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF BARNETT LUMBER COMPANY.

Know all men by these presents that we, the undersigned, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming and becoming a corporation in the State of Nebraska, for the transaction of the business hereinafter stated and for the purpose of continuing the business of the corporation under the same name whose incorporation expires March 1st, 1922.

Art. 1. The name of the Corporation shall be Barnett Lumber Company. The principal place for the transaction of its business shall be in the City of McCook, Red Willow County, State of Nebraska, and branch yards may be established wherever desired.

Art. 2. The nature of the business to be transacted is dealing in Lumber, Coal, Grain, Hardware, Live Stock, Real Estate, General Merchandise, Contracting and such other business as we may desire to connect therewith.

Art. 3. The authorized Capital of said Corporation shall be One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000) Dollars in shares of One Hundred (\$100) Dollars each, full paid and non-assessable, with the privilege of increasing said capital upon a two-thirds vote of all the stockholders, giving one vote for each share of stock.

Art. 4. The existence of this Corporation shall begin on the 1st day of March, 1922, and continue until the period of twenty years.

Art. 5. The business of said Corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors, not to exceed in number, to be elected by the stockholders.

Art. 6. The manner of voting at meetings of the stockholders for choice of members of the Board of Directors shall be by ballot and each stockholder shall be entitled to one vote, in person or by proxy, for each share of stock owned or held by him. There shall be an annual meeting of the stockholders of this Corporation at the office of the Company in the City of McCook, Nebraska, for the election of directors and for the transaction of such other business as may be necessary on the first Monday in January of each year.

Art. 7. The officers of this Corporation shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer who shall be chosen by the directors and shall hold their offices for the period of one year and until their successors are elected subject however to the will of the Board of Directors.

Art. 8. Private property of the stockholders shall be exempt from liability for the debts of the Corporation.

Art. 9. The highest amount of indebtedness to which said Corporation shall at any time subject itself shall not be more than Sixty-Six Thousand (\$66,000) Dollars.

Art. 10. The Company is hereby empowered to hold real estate and personal property of all kinds.

Art. 11. The Company may have a corporate seal upon which shall be inscribed the words, "Barnett Lumber Company."

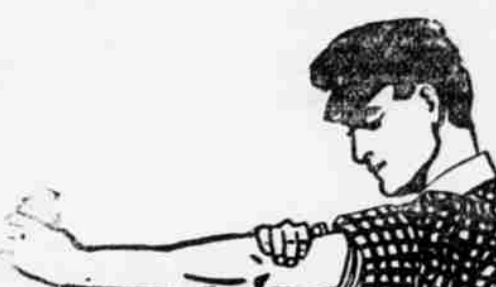
