Steve Fitzgibbons is threshing cane seed this week.

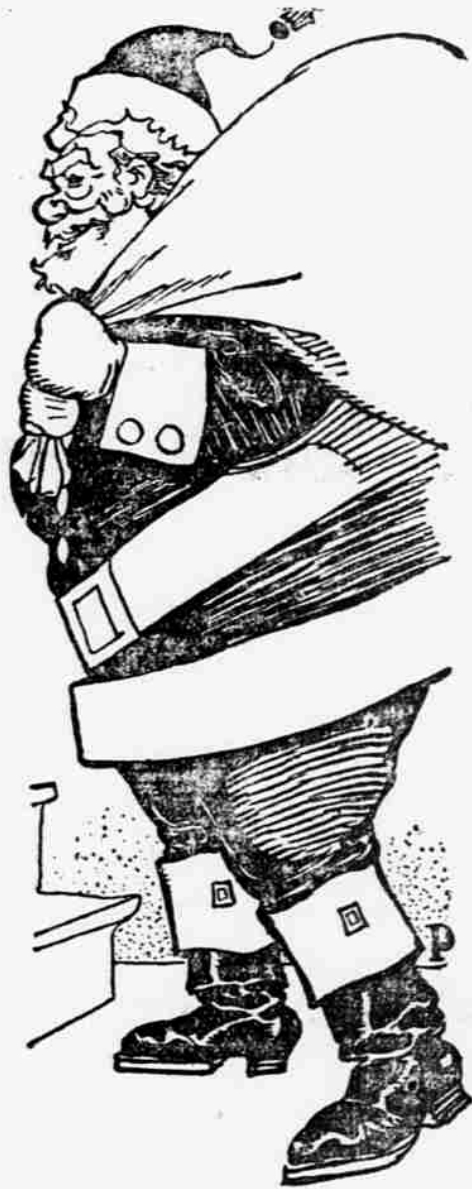

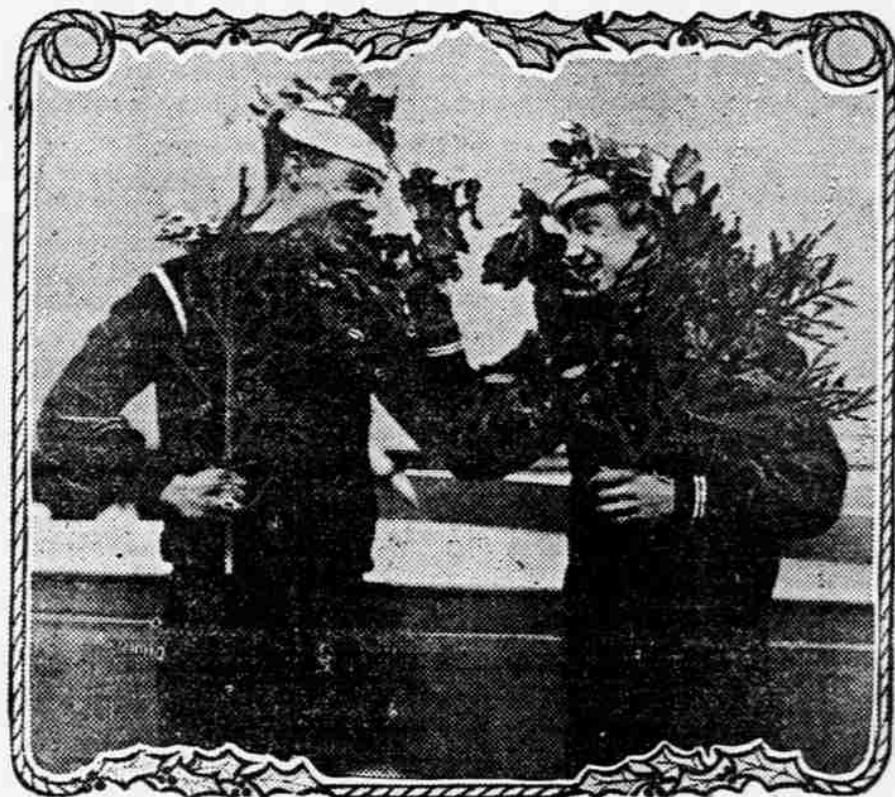


THE JOLLY JACK TAR
