## DEMOCRATS TURN TO 1912; EYES CENTER ON NORRIS

While the republicans have been usurping political activities by filing in goodly numbers for various places which will be filled by election this fall, democrats have been manifesting fully as much activity by coming out in authorized statements in which they declare their intentions in regard to 1912 races. The election of a United States senator precedes everything else in interest, as far as the beating of the public pulse discloses, and the fact that three democrats have already talked themselves into the race is causing some curiosity as to who the republican candidates will be when the time rolls around for filing.

In this connection talk centers on the possibility of George W. Norris, present congressman from the Fifth district, entering the primaries to secure the republican nomination over the present incumbent Norris Brown. Those who are closest to the progressive fighter from the Fifth say that he has given little or no indication as to what he will do in that regard. By several of his staunchest supporters, however, it is believed that he is laying low and biding his time placing great emphasis on the possible early or late closing of the present special session. This, they say, would be a matter of importance to Congressman Norris if he meant to make the senatorial fight, inasmuch as he would need to spend considerable time in the state in the event that he entered the race. A late closing of the session would mean little time for the Red Willow county man to get in touch with state political conditions while an early closing, about August 1 as has been suggested by some members of congress, would give him sufficient leeway and an opportunity to find out his standing in Nebraska.

"An early primary next year, coming as it does on April 15, will give neither Senator Brown nor Congressman Norris any great amount of time for campaigning as the regular ses-

sion of congress will convene early in December and may be drawn out until well toward that time. These things, according to Congressman Norris' friends, undoubtedly are being weighed in his mind and will play no small part in helping him arrive at a decision in the matter of becoming a candidate.

Further, as was suggested by a Fifth district republican, who is in close touch with the party's interests, a third man who was on the ground might make the race rather lively for both of them, having the advantage of a three-cornered affair and being more thoroughly in touch with state conditions than either of the two active lawmakers. And not the least influence is the fact that some of Congressman Norris' best workers are of the opinion he should remain in the lower house of congress, where they assert, he has started a work that he can bring to a more successful termination than by moving over to the other end of the national capital building.

Upon Congressman Norris' decision may rest the decision of Auditor Silas Barton to get in the political puddle in a more advantageous place. It is known among the auditor's friends that in case the McCook man decides to run the senatorial derby the Grand Island man will take up the republican congressional reins in the Fifth and endeavor to defeat Roderick Dhu Sutherland who asserts that he will make the race once more in that district. But in case Norris concludes to stay where he is and let well enough alone, it is rumored that Auditor Barton will enter the republican gubernatorial race in an attempt to out distance his present chief, Governor Aldrich, who it is understood, will seek renomination. — Lincoln Evening News.

### County Commissioners' Proceedings

(Continued from page 1).

McCook, Nebraska, June 15th, 1911. The county board of equalization met pursuant to adjournment, present: F. S. Lofton, Edward Sughroue and W. N. Rogers, county commissioners; T. A. Endsley, county assessor; Chas. Skalla, county clerk, and Chas. D. Ritchie, county attorney.

A motion was made by Sughroue, seconded by Rogers, that the valuation of the improvements of R. L. Diamond, situated on lots 13, 14 and 15, block 20, original town of McCook, be reduced from \$400 to \$200, and that the assessment of the house of Mrs. David Diamond, on lot 7, in block 21, first addition to McCook City, be reduced from \$1,500 to \$1,400. Voting yea: Lofton, Sughroue, Rogers—3. Voting nay: Endsley, and Skalla—2. Motion was declared carried.

A motion was made by Skalla, that the house of Rose E. Bayless on lots 1, 2 and 3, block 17, original town of McCook, be reduced from \$3,000 to \$2,000. The roll call was ordered and resulted as follows: Yea: Rogers, Skalla, 2. Nay: Lofton, Sughroue, Endsley, 3. Motion declared lost.

A motion was made by Endsley, seconded by Sughroue, that the valuation of the house of Rose E. Bayless on lots 1, 2 and 3, block 17, original town of McCook, be reduced from \$3,000 to \$2,200. The roll call resulted as follows: Yea: Lofton, Sughroue, Rogers, Endsley, 4. Nay: Skalla, 1. Motion was declared carried.

A motion was made by Skalla, that the local agent or representative of the McCook Electric Co. be notified to appear before this board June 20, 1911, and show cause why the personal property assessment of this company should not be raised to the full amount of their paid up capital stock. The roll call resulted: Yea: Skalla, 1. Nay: Lofton, Sughroue, Rogers, Endsley, 4. Motion declared lost.

A motion was made by Sughroue, seconded by Rogers, that the valuation of the improvements of H. W. Keyes, on lot 1, block 27, City of Indianola, be raised from \$1,200 to \$1,800, H. W. Keyes, having been notified and appeared before the board. The roll call resulted as follows: Yea: Lofton, Rogers, Sughroue, Endsley, 4. Nay, Skalla, for the reason that the precinct assessor did not see fit to assess any additional improvements on said lots at assessment time. Motion declared carried.

On motion the clerk was instructed to notify Otto Webber to appear before this board June 20, 1911, and show cause why the valuation of the improvements on lots 23 and 24, in block 53, original town of Bartley, should not be raised from \$1,500 to \$2,000.

On motion the board adjourned to meet June 20th, 1911.
