#### **GETS GOLD FROM SEA WATER**

Dr. Oskar Nagel Claims That He Has a Machine Which Will Do This.

Oskar Nagel, Ph. D., an Austrian Forty-first street, confided to the newsway to extract gold and potash from sea water and that with a plant that will cost complete not more than-\$242,000, he could take from the sca \$1,300,000 worth of gold a year. This, he added, meant a gold production of about \$3,600 a day to get which will cost about \$300, leaving a clear profit of \$3,300 each working day in the

Doctor Nagel purposes, after he has, passed the salt waters of the globe through his extracting pumps and squeezed the gold and potash from them, to return them again to the seas, so that there need be no appre. day. hension of the disappearance of those useful bodies of water.

Doctor Nagel told first of his method of getting potash from the sea. He did not say that he believed he could extract the great commercial article, of which \$20,000,000 is imported each many, but stated most positively that he has proved already the value of his invention.-New York Times.
