The Cambridge Commercial club has filed a complaint with the railway commission asking for an order requiring the Burlington road to stop more passenger trains at that town and to provide a better depot. No specific number of trains is asked for. It is alleged in the complaint that the waiting room of the depot is often filled with crates of fruit, eggs, poultry and butter "to deflect the presence of which does not require the nostrils of a modern muck raker." The complaint charges discrimination in that the road has better depot facilities at Oxford and Alma and other towns half as large as Cambridge.
