THE following is a translation of a dispatch written by Publius Lentulus, President in Judea to the Roman Senate, concerning the Redeemer, the original of which is preserved in the Vatician at Rome.

"There hath appeared in these our days, and is at present living among us, in Judea, a man of singular virtue, whom they call Jesus Christ. Of the Jews he is accepted and believed to be a great prophet of the truth; but his own disciples adore him as being descended from the immortal God. He raiseth the dead to life, and cureth all manner of human maladies and diseases by the word or touch.
