THE dispatch from Rio de Janeiro stating that the Senate and Chamber of Deputies have passed a bill for the gradual abolition of slavery in Brazil may furnish cause for rejoicing and regret among our own people. With an estimated population of 12,000,000 of whom 1,233,195 were held in slavery in September of last year, it will be seen that the proportion of slave to free inhabitants in Brazil in 1884 was larger than that of slave to free people in this country in 1860, and yet Brazil has undertaken to conquer this trouble by law, like Christian men, without murdering a half a million men, as was done in our civil war. A law for gradual emancipation was passed in 1871, which provided that children thenceforth born of slave women should be "considered of 250 free condition." The present bill provides that all slaves of more than sixty years of age shall be at once declared free. Those remaining shall be divided into classes, according to age and value. In seventeen years they shall all be free. So within twenty-five years from the dawn of the reform begun by Dom Pedro's Parliament the question of slavery in Brazil will be solved and the last independent portion of the American continent where slavery was allowed will be free, and without the shedding of blood.


