"THE LAST SPEAKER—Hon. J. C. Allen of McCook, the young candidate for secretary of state, was introduced and said a good word for the other members of the ticket, modestly keeping himself in the background. He said he stood firmly on the platform of the Republican party and expected to stay there."

THERE are fewer McKeighan men in Red Willow county than there were before that gentleman spoke in McCook, last Saturday, and gave such unmistakable evidences of his absolute and entire unfitness for the high office to which he aspires at the hands of this people.
