# WHOLESALE MURDER

## A QUACK DOCTOR KILLS MANY INFANT CHILDREN.

### AT LEAST FORTY PUT TO DEATH.

#### A Pennsylvania Woman Murders Three Children—An Old Man Kills His Wife, Seriously Wounds His Stepdaughter, and Commits Suicide.—Kansas University Students Robbed.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 29.—A short time ago a man calling himself Dr. Henry C. Beal, his wife, known as Nellie Haven, and Hattie E. Graham were arrested charged with the murder, by malpractice, of Mary Carol, the daughter of a Petaluma county farmer. Beal forfeited \$5,000 bail and disappeared, but the women are still in prison. According to the story of a Mrs. Montrose, Beal has committed a great number of murders that heal used her house for during months as a private hospital. Ten that period he had about fifty patients, and there were no fewer than forty children born alive in the house, not one of them being permitted to live. Beal either chloroformed or drowned his helpless victims, after which he weighed their bodies and threw them into the bay or cremated them.

LOOTED AND BURNED. CALIFORNIA, Mo., Sept. 29.—The large general store of J. T. Tising at High Point, a village two miles south of this city, was burned early yesterday morning together with all the contents. On examining the safe it was found that a hole had been drilled into it and the door blown off and it is presumed robbers secured its contents, amounting to several hundred dollars, and then set the building on fire to cover up their tracks. Total loss \$15,000; insurance \$8,000.

TRIPLE TRAGEDY. PATTERSON, N. J., Sept. 29.—A frightful tragedy was enacted last night in this city. Joseph Mellenburg murdered his wife, shot and seriously wounded his stepdaughter and took his own life. The tragedy was the outcome of a petty quarrel over a settlement of a judgment recovered against the Mellenburgs in the district court. Mrs. Mellenburg was 76 years old and her husband 74.

MURDERED LITTLE CHILDREN. BORDENTOWN, Pa., Sept. 29.—Jennie Schmitt, a German woman of this place, yesterday murdered three small children by choking them to death at her house at No. 4 Chestnut street. One of the victims was her own son and the two others were the little sons of William Bodker, a neighbor. The children's ages range from 1 to 3 years. The woman is believed to be insane.

WEAVER CALLED TO TASK THE STATEMENTS ABOUT BAD TREATMENT IN GEORGIA POSITELY DENIED.

ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 29.—Hon. W. Y. Atkinson, chairman of the Democratic executive committee of Georgia, says in reply to the published address of General Weaver and various special telegrams which have been sent out from Georgia by Mrs. Lease, that they do great injustice, not only to the Democrats, but to the people of the state. He says:

"According to his own admission General Weaver received a respectful hearing at Waycross and Columbus. At Albany his speech was listened to by several hundred people, and no effort whatever was made to prevent him from speaking. A prominent negro of that place, at the conclusion of Weaver's speech, took the stand to refute what he had said, and bitterly attacked Weaver and the third party. Weaver was so indignant that a negro should attempt to answer him, that he immediately left the platform. The only possible foundation for the greatly exaggerated egg story spread broadcast by General Weaver and Mrs. Lease is that a small boy in the open air audience at Macon, threw an egg and he was promptly arrested and punished for it. Weaver's claim of persecution is nothing more than an overworked effort to pose as a martyr. His statements deliberately misrepresent the people of Georgia, and were cunningly devised for campaign purposes."

"JIM CUMMINGS" FREE AGAIN THE BOLD EXPRESS ROBBER RELEASED FROM THE PENITENTIARY.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Sept. 29.—A tall, well formed young man of about 30 years was in Kansas City yesterday shaking hands with and receiving the congratulations of old friends. To strangers he was introduced as Mr. Fred Wittrock of Leavenworth, but none of them comprehended who the man really was until informed that he was famous in criminal history as "Jim Cummings," the perpetrator of the boldest express robbery recorded in recent years. Wittrock completed his six years' sentence in the Missouri penitentiary Monday and came at once to Kansas City to look for employment. He did not meet with success yesterday but after a visit to his mother and sister at Leavenworth he will return here and renew his search.

Mrs. Cleveland Loses Her Suit. OMAHA, Neb., Sept. 29.—Mrs. Grover Cleveland, wife of the Democratic candidate for president, was the plaintiff in a suit tried by Justice Bradley yesterday morning in which Abraham Lincoln Reed was defendant. Abraham Lincoln Reed was agent for the plaintiff, and Abraham Lincoln Dick was attorney for the defendant. The suit was to recover possession of a blacksmith shop occupied by the defendant and owned by the plaintiff. A jury was called and found for the defendant, because he had an agreement giving him an extension of time.

# CONDITION OF THE INDIANS.

## Report of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs Submitted to Secretary Noble.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—Indian Commissioner Morgan has submitted to Secretary Noble his annual report. "The government has a well defined policy of dealing with the Indians," says Commissioner Morgan, "the essential element of which is suggested by the one phrase, 'American citizenship.' Citizenship accompanied by the allotment of lands necessarily looks toward the entire destruction of the tribal relation and the dealing with the Indians as individuals. It will destroy the whole agency system and eventually do away with the necessity of any Indian bureau. Citizenship is to be conferred upon the Indian when he has acquired sufficient education to warrant the change."

The subject of Indian education is covered fully, its difficulties are pointed out, a general survey of the field is presented and the tables are given showing the different kinds of schools in operation, their capacity and attendance.

There are now in operation or soon to be opened twenty large training schools, located in the midst of civilized communities, in the Indian reserve agencies. Three years ago there were eight such institutions. When complete their capacity will be about 50,000 pupils. The total enrollment of pupils in all these schools for the year ending June 30, 1892, was nearly 20,000, an increase of more than 4,000 within three years, or more than 25 per cent. Four years more at this rate of progress will see practically all Indian children gathered into schools.

The plan of detailing army officials to take charge of Indian agencies is fully discussed and disapproved.

MISSOURI CROPS. A Week of Excessive Heat and Sunshine Has Matured Corn.

COLUMBIA, Mo., Sept. 29.—The weather crop bulletin of the Missouri weather service of the state board of agriculture for the week ending September 24 says: "This has been a week of excessive heat and sunshine. So little rain has fallen that drought continues, and may be said to have prevailed and was detrimental principally to pastures, stock and prompt germination of early sown wheat. Under the above named conditions corn made rapid advancement toward maturing. The greater part of the plant is now beyond damage by frost, and cutting is general in southern counties. Much of the wheat acreage has been sown, and much of what has come up is being seriously injured by grasshoppers."

The Oklahoma Gerymander. GUTHRIE, Ok., Sept. 29.—The apportionment board appointed by an act of congress to redistrict the territory into congressional and representative districts completed their work yesterday afternoon. They found the population of the territory to be 123,000. A close examination of the districts and their boundaries shows that the Democratic and Alliance members of the board outvoted the Republican members and arranged the districts to suit themselves, giving to their two parties fully two-thirds of the district by large majorities. The Republicans are indignant, but cannot help themselves.
