

**NOTICE OF AMENDED ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF CITIZENS BANK OF MCCOOK.**

1st. The name of this bank is The Citizens Bank of McCook.

 In the matter of the establishment of a county poor farm, for Red Willow county:  
 On motion the assent and proposition of James C. Oakley is accepted.  
 On motion James C. Oakley is appointed to operate and superintend the poor house of Red Willow county for one year from this date, and to have the same under the supervision and management of said county.  
 On motion it is ordered that the county commissioners of Red Willow county enter into a contract with James C. Oakley for the operation of the poor house of said county and for the care and maintenance of the inmates of said poor house; whereupon an agreement was made and entered into, by and between Red Willow county and James C. Oakley.  
 It appearing from the petition of J. H. Lewis, Charles Harrison et al., and upon due investigation the board find that the public good demands it, and upon motion the following road is established and opened:  
 Commencing at northeast corner of section 26, town 2, range 27, running thence south to the southeast corner of section 35, town 2, range 27, and terminating thereat. Clerk directed to notify overseer of highway to open the same, also to notify land owners along line of said road to file claims for damages on or to the land caused by the said road, by reason of the location of said road.
