INTERESTING, IF TRUE.

The Detroit Labor Advocate tells of a Danvers, (Mass.) teamster named Danvers, who retires at the age of ninety years with \$50,000 saved up from his wages of \$12 a week. This comes under the head of "important if true." Assuming that it cost Brother Danvers an average of \$4 a week for board, lodging, laundry, clothing, doctor bills, reading matter, etc., he could save \$8 a week.
