The scale committee of the Brotherhood of Boltermakers, covering the Burlington system, has completed the work for which it was called to Lincoln to accomplish. The committee met last week and continued in session over Sunday, and many points heretofore somewhat obscure were straightened out to the satisfaction of all concerned. Only the boltermakers employed by the Burlington system are directly interested in the work of this committee, although it is only natural that the boltermakers every-

where should be interested in what is secured on that system.

A total of 1,200 men, scattered from Chicago to Denver, was represented by the committee, which consists of fourteen members. Not all the members were present, but those not here were represented by proxy.

First Vice-President Hinzman of Kansas City attended the meetings of the committee and gave its members the benefit of his experience in scale negotiations. J. W. Jonas of Havelock was selected as president of the com-

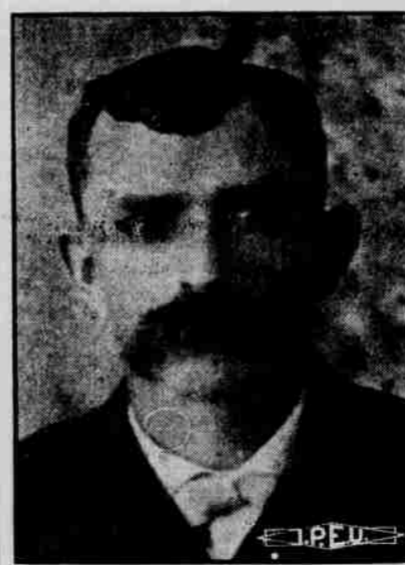
mittee and presided with fairness and ability. William Cooper of Galesburg, Ill., was vice-president, and D. V. Farlow of Denver was selected as secretary-treasurer. P. E. Sullivan of Sheridan, Wyo.; John LeHue of McCook, Neb., and W. M. Flannigan of Aurora, Ill., were elected trustees.

Locals at Lincoln, Havelock, McCook and Alliance, Neb.; Denver, Colo.; Edgmont, S. Dak.; Creston, Iowa; St. Joseph, Mo., and Beardstown, Galesburg and Chicago, Ill., were represented.

The visiting delegates were well entertained by the local members of the craft, and all expressed themselves as delighted with the courtesies shown them. A visit to the Labor Temple brought many expressions of surprise at its commodious and handsome facilities.

The full details of the new scale proposition have not yet been worked out, but this is a matter of routine only and will be attended to shortly. As soon as this is done the scale will be presented to the Burlington management and the negotiations will be on in earnest. The committee, acting under instructions, declined to make known any changes from the old scale, although it is tacitly admitted that an increase in wages will be asked.

### IRON WORKERS RECEIVE RAISE.

Five thousand iron workers employed by the Iron League Electors' Association of Greater New York, who received an increase of 30 cents a day in the early part of January, bringing the wages up to \$4.80 a day, will receive \$5 a day the first of July. Following all the recent labor victories the employers feared that there would be an outbreak in their trade, so they have taken this step, and voluntarily raised the wages in order to avoid a strike.

The constitutionality of the Wisconsin co-employe law has been sustained by the supreme court.

### TALKS AT THE TEMPLE

Chaplain Malley was the speaker at the Sunday afternoon "Temple Talk," held at the Labor Temple the first day of the present week. A splendid delegation of Havelock unionists came over to show their appreciation of the eloquent champion of unionism. They had already heard him at the First Christian church of Havelock, of which he is pastor, and they knew they would hear something out of the ordinary. Rev. Mr. Malley was chaplain of the First Nebraska regiment and saw service with that fighting bunch through the Philippine campaigns. He has made a thorough study of the industrial problem and spoke "by the card" for nearly an hour. The attendance was better than at any previous meeting, but lacked many hundreds of being what it should have been. Lincoln workers present never heard a more logical and argumentative defense of organization than Chaplain Malley made. An effort was made to secure a verbatim copy of the address in time for this week's issue, but it was found impossible. The address, however, will be printed in full next week, and we commend it to the careful reading of every worker who wants to be equipped for argument with those who oppose trades unionism.

In terse, vigorous terms the speaker explained the need of organization in all departments of human activity. In equally vigorous terms he denounced those who would take advantage of

the weak and helpless. He spoke of the practical sympathy practiced by trades unionism's advocates, and made a plea for a "square deal" that would include all the people, high and low.

The address was listened to with closest interest and the speaker was frequently interrupted by applause. Because of the intent to publish the address in full next week no attempt at giving a synopsis will be made at this time. The speaker was introduced by W. M. Maupin, and at the close the assembly was dismissed. "To attempt to add anything to what Chaplain Malley has said would be little short of sacrilege," said Mr. Maupin in dismissing the assembly.

### MISS EAVES WILL SPEAK.

Prof. Lucile Eaves, of the University of Nebraska, will speak at the Labor Temple next Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock, her subject being "Lessons From the San Francisco Labor Movement." Miss Eaves is a thorough unionist and has made a life-time study of the labor movement. Her address will be a rare treat to the union men and women.
