IN OLAHOMA.

Lee Cruce, on assuming the duties of governor of Oklahoma took occasion to defend the constitution of that state "branded," he said, "by the enemies as radical and even vicious," and said in part: "We assert that there is nothing radical or strikingly new in our constitution. We have simply attempted to profit by the experiences of others. Oklahoma's constitution is the condensation into a single instrument of the best and most vital provisions to be found in forty-five other state constitutions. That operation under the constitution is conducive to good government is established by the unprecedented growth of Oklahoma since statehood. Capital and labor," he added, "should be friends. Both are sorely needed in the development of the state, and neither shall unduly oppress the other if I can help it."
