DO NOT JUDGE HASTILY.

Several union ironworkers in St. Joseph, Mo., are under arrest, charged with having dynamited a couple of school buildings that were being erected by non-union ironworkers.

Without knowing anything at all about the merits of the case, The Wageworker is willing to wager that there is a scheme n foot either to cover up a couple of losing contracts or to discredit the ironwerkers' union. It is very easy to explode a little gunpowder under a bit of iron work, and then make a play for public sympathy by charging the "outrage" to union labor. That sort of thing has been worked time and again, and more than once the daily newspapers have "fallen" for the scheme. Or a contractor, seeking to get rid of a losing contract plugs up a "union outrage' and then gets an extension of time or an amendment to his contract that will permit him to make good a loss entailed because of his own ignorance. That, too, has been done.

There is no denying that union men have often been guilty of outrages-not, however, because they were union men, but because they were men. But the average union-ist knows that to forfeit public sym-pathy is to destroy practically every chance to win a victory. Why, then, should a union man attempt to destroy buildings on which union labor was discriminated against and non-union labor employed?

It is always wise to double discount all these daily newspaper stories of "union outrages," In the first place they are always fearfully exaggerated. In the second place they are seldom rightfully chargeable to union men. Before judgment is passed in this St. Joseph case, just wait until further facts are made public.
