Mr. William George Taylor, formerly Instructor in Political and Ecocomic Science at the University of Nebraska, Lincoln, has been made Adjunct Professor in those subjects, and has been placed in charge of the Department of Political and Economic Sciences. Professor Taylor was born in New York City on May 13, 1859. He attended public and private schools in New York, and when he was eighteen entered Harvard University. In 1880 he graduated from Harvard with the degree of A. B. (magna cum laude). He studied law for one year at Columbia and two at Harvard, receiving, in 1883, from the latter institution the degree of LL. B. The following year he was admitted to the New York bar. In 1886 he went abroad and spent four years in study and travel. During 1887-88 he attended lectures at the Ecole des sciences politiques and the College de France, in Paris, chiefly those of Leroy-Beaulieu.
