They were citizens of a kingdom not of this world, the very foundation stone of which was liberty, equality and fraternity. They had also been taught that all class distinctions among men sustained by force of law did not exist in the nature of things, by the will of God.

Now, can there be a colony organized upon some practical plan to include these principles?
