SETTLERS ARMING.

GRAVE TROUBLE LOOKED FOR IN THAT TERRITORY.

THR UTE INDIANS MUST BE REMOVED

The White Settlers Have Notified Everydy to Have the Wemen and Chil-iron Removed to Pinces of Safety They Intend to Drive the Indians Back Into Colorado or Out of Utak

WASHINGTON. Dec. 10 - Delegate Rawlins of Utah says he looks for war in Utah before the Ute Indian difficulties are settled. The latest reports that he has received show that the Indians have advanced within thirty miles of Mosb and have caused the ettlers a great deal of trouble, robsettlers a great deal of trouble, robbing and pillaging and driving off stock. The white settlers have notified everybody to have the women and children removed to places of safety, and are arming and intend to drive the Indians back into Colorodo, or at least out of Utah. Rawlins has called the attention of Secretary Smith to the anticipated troubles, and told him that the settlers will remove the Indians if the government does not.

Cyrus Bussey Explains at Longth the Objects of the New Order.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—General Cyrus Bussey, assistant secretary of the interior under President Harrison, has been elected president of the

has been elected president of the "American Knights of Protection," which has just been incorporated under the laws of Maryland.

"The order." said General Bussey, "is a non-sectarian, non-secret patriotic organization founded upon broad American principles and, in order to make it more cohesive and permanent, its constitution and character provide for a financial beneficial feature to its members. Its declaration of principles includes adherence to the doctrine of protection to American interests, industries and homes. It will seek, through its lodges, its literature, the courses of educational discussions which it will inaugurate and the fraternal co-operation of its discussions which it will inaugurate and the fraternal co-operation of its members to organize all believers in its creed throughout the United States into a permanent organization. It will advocate and support the continuance of a tariff, adjusted to the necessities of protection to American interests, restrain foreign immigration, so that neither pauper labor nor its products shall come untaxed to our country; purity of elecour country; purity of elec-tions through intelligent exer-cise of franchise and the prose-cution of all fraudulent prac-tices, defense of the integrity of public school system, the study of the constitution and American history. It will seek in various ways to revive can patriotism, and finally will provide a system of practical financial benefits to the families of its members, in case of sickness, accident or

The safe that the robbers looted was the same one opened in the Gordon robbery a short time ago.

The officers engaged in the pursuit are confident the desperadoes are members of the Cook gang and that they are making for the Indian Territory. LABOR UNION CHARTERS.

Government Control of Organizations of Workingmen Provided For. WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.-Two im-

portant changes in the bill for na-tional arbitration of strikes have been made as a result of the conference between Labor Commissioner Wright and Representatives McGann, Springer and Erdman. They are, that labor unions be chartered by the government and that the charter of a labor union be forfeited when its

labor union be forfeited when its members resort to violence in the interest of strikes.

It is probable that the measure as thus amended will be laid before congress. Commissioners Wright and Kernan, who made the recent investigation of the Pullman strike, will appear before the labor committee Tuesday, to state their views on perfecting the bill.

EMBARGO ON CATTLE

One of the Questions Discussed at th National Live Stock Meeting.

Sr. Louis, Mo., Dec. 10. - The time at the afternoon and evening sessions of the National Live Stock Exchange was taken up with the discussion and settlement of three questions. The first of these was the embargo of forign countries on American live stock and meat products. It was decided to petition congress and the depart-ments to take such action as will tend

to lift the embargo.

In regard to the second question—government inspection—it was decided to address a set of resolutions to cided to address a set of resolutions to Secretary J. Sterling Morton of the agricultural department, requesting that the system of government inspection of cattle and meat products be made uniform as far as local conditions will permit; that inspectors be appointed only with regard to fitness and be removed only for cause (incompetency and negligence), and that the system of inspection be extended to all slaughter houses within the jurisdiction of the department.

The subject of chattel mortgages oncattle was submitted in the shape of a report from a committee which favored the amendment of the laws relating to the subject at the next session of the different state legisla-

session of the different state legislatures. The report was adopted.

CHAMP CLARK BREAKS LOOSE. The Missourian Fights a Bill for Retire ment of Hevenue Marine Officers.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10. - Less than twenty-five members were presto order at noon to-day. In the morning hour, Mr. Mallory of Florida from the committee on interstate commerce called up the bill to promote the efficiency of the revenue cutter service. It provides for the retirement of the officers of the service incapacitated by reason of the infirmities of age or physical or mental disabilities. Mr. Mallory, Mr. English of New Jersey and Mr. Covert of New York supported the bill, but it was antagonized by Mr. Clark of Missouri, who deliberately avowed his intention of talking it to death. DRUNKEN MEN FIGHT.

Iwo Killed Outright, One Malmed for

Life, Two Seriously Wounded. GUTHER, Ok., Dec. 10.-A regular pitched battle took place yesterday morning on the highway between Alva and Eagle Chief. James Brown, J. R. Knight, Charles Kitchen, Sam Wescott, and a man called One-Eye Taylor, who lives near Eagle Chief, were returning home with their bodies soaked with whisky. On the road they met Sam Crocker, a killer, and they met sam crocker, a killer, and three rangers en route to Alva. The drunken men stopped and one without provocation opened fire on Crocker. Immediately a fusilade of shots followed and a regular battle ensued. Kitchen and Brown were killed outright, Sam Wescott was maimed for life and Taylor was badly mounded. During the fight a deputy wounded. During the fight a deputy United States marshal rode along and received a severe wound from a stray bullet. The whole difficulty was brought on by liquor.

FULL HEARINGS DESIRED.

The argument in the cases of all but newspaper men was postponed until December 32, but Judge Dittonhoefer of New York spoke on the demurrers to the two written indictments.

Wills, who held a second mortaage on the property. There was only one bid of \$10,000 and it was made by Wills over and above the amount due to Russell Sage on the first mortgage.

cost the tabernacle.

Non-Citisen Employes Forbidden. TALEQUAR, Ind. Ter., Dec. 10 -A bill has passed both houses of the Cherokee council prohibiting the employment by merchants and traders of this nation of non-citizen clerks, bookkeepers or business managers.

If it should be signed by the chief and thus become a law, it will especially effect the druggists, who are compelled to employ non-citizen druggists, there being but few natives educated in pharmacy.

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 3 .- The department of Indian affairs was informed by telegraph from Butte City, Mont. yesterday that 300 Canadian Cree Indians were up in arms against the whites, and cattle were being killed and stolen. The department officials are of the opinion that the Indians are not Canadians, but those who emigrated after Riel's rebellion ended.
