EMBEZZLEMENT IS DENIED.

Ex-Priest Wagner Proposes to Fight His Old Church's Charges.

St. JOSEPH, Mo., Oct. 9 .- Ex-Priest Wagner has employed attorneys to defend him in the charge made by the trustees of St. Mary's church that he is short \$2,000 in his accounts. When the trustees made a charge against him he claimed that the church owed him \$5,000, a part of the sum being for pew rent. He said to-day that he had no fear of being convicted of embezzlement, and when the case was settled he intended to study law or medi-

The ex-priest's father is living at Washington heights, near Chicago. The elder Wagner was a shoemaker in Chicago for many years, where Wagner learned the printing and plumbing trades. The young man was educated for the priesthood at St. Vincent's college in Pennsylvania and at the New Engelberg college in Nod-away county; Mo. At the time of his exposure he was under the orders of the abbot of New Engelberg. His wife has not visited the jail since they

A fourth indictment was returned against Wagner by the grand jury this morning. This charges embezzlement of \$1,500 of the funds of St. Mary's shurch, of which he was pastor. The prosecution claims to have a strong case. It is alleged that Wagner began to misappropriate money intrusted to him during the first year of his pastorate and that the shortage may exceed the sum mentioned.


