How to Pherane Hides for Romes.—As soon as hide is removed from animal, with off head and legs, spread out on thoo, cover well with sait, (medium sized fildes will require two and one-half gailons of sait, evenly spread), leave in this condition for ten to filteen days, then roll up flesh side out, its well, and ship. Charges for tanning will be from \$1.00 to \$0.00 on medium sized hides.
