The restoration of silver is therefore demanded upon every theory of money that has ever been propounded by any responsible writer. It is demanded, also upon the ground that the act of 1873 was uncalled for, claudestine, fraudulent, and designedly against the interest of this country, and against the interest of the producing classes the world over. Whether that act caused gold to rise ontrol, in either case the act was the guilty cause of the rise of money in this country, i. e. the fall of prices. 
