Each of these plans, except the last, is partial and sectional to a great ex-

The sub-treasury plan is partial in that it only provides for issuing money on a certain class of security, non-pertional in that it is advocated most

The land-loan plan only recognizes one kind of security, land; and its chief support comes from the north and

The plan of postal savings banks, as usually considered, only provides for one of these demands, the 5th, and it is chiefly in the interest of one class, the laboring men of the cities.

These plans are not to be condemned because of these defects.
